

# Campbellton Royals Win Midget Hockey Ch'ship From Abbies In Overtime

CAMPBELLTON, N. B.—(CP)—Campbellton Royals won the N. B. P. E. 1. midget hockey championship here Wednesday night by edging Charlottetown Midgets 8-6 in overtime. Abbies were the defending champions.

It was the third N.B.-P.E.L. crown won by Campbellton teams this season: The Tigers won the intermediate and the Cubs the juvenile division.

The winners outscored the Island team 3-1 in the first period but the Abbies took over in the middle stanza to fire four goals against the Cubs' two to end the period 5-5.

Charlottetown went out front 6-5 on a goal by Simmonds with Bellevue tying up the game at 19:33 for Campbellton to force it into overtime.

Dickie Troy scored the winner and Bill Brooks the insurance marker for the champions in overtime.

## Nearula Wins Guineas To Justify Forecasts

NEWMARKET, (CP)—A plain-looking colt named Nearula won the Two Thousand Guineas in a breeze Wednesday and promptly became a hot favorite for the Derby five weeks hence.

Justifying the pre-race forecasts of just about every selector in the country, the bay colt from Yorkshire went to the front two furlongs from home and left his 15 opponents "hanging out to dry" in a swift-run race.

Nearula, first horse trained in the north of England to win the Two Thousand Guineas in the last 50 years, finished four lengths ahead of the filly, Bebe Grande, with the speedy Olandrin third and King of the Tudors fourth. The Aga Khan's Masal King, second choice at 6 to 1, finished seventh.

The Queen's horse Aureole finished sixth.

It was the first of Britain's five classic races and the way Nearula won showed he is a colt, far out of the ordinary, at least at distances up to a mile. He finished second in his first race as a two-year-old and has won his last three races in the style of a champion.

Nearula is owned by Yorkshireman William Humble and trained by Capt. Charles Eley, who prepared the fillies Musidora and Frieze to win post-war classic
