IN MEMORIAM

PETER CUSACK
His many friends and acquaintances of Emyvale and surrounding districts were saddened to hear of the sudden passing of Peter Cusack, at the Charlottetown Hospital on Jan. 26th, 1957. The late Mr. Cusack, who was in his 74th year, was the son of the late John Cusack and Ellen McGee of Brookvale, Lot 30.
Although he had been in failing health for some time, being a victim of severe asthma attacks, his death came as a shock to his family and friends. With the exception of eight years which were spent in U.S.A., he lived his entire life on Prince Edward Island. Forty-seven years ago he settled in Emyvale, where he proved himself an industrious farmer.
Pete, as he was familiarly known to all, was of a kind and jovial disposition. The company of the young people he especially enjoyed and they were always welcome in his home. He was a faithful member of St. Anne's Parish and as always active in all parish affairs. All his life he was a strong supporter of the Conservative party.
In 1909, he married Mary Ellen Clarkin of Emyvale, who predeceased him twenty-two years ago. From this union, nine children were born, all of whom survive. He will be sadly missed in the home where he lived with his son John, and by other members of the family on the island, and in Ontario, with whom he used to visit at regular intervals.
He leaves to mourn four daughters and five sons: Mrs. Reginald Kelly, Kelly's Cross, Mrs. Ernest Flood, Charlottetown; Mrs. Clarence Curley, Kelly's Cross; Mrs. Walter Varette, Ottawa; Emmett, Joseph, Leo and Leonard, Toronto; John, Emyvale; and two great grandchildren. Three brothers also survive: Walter, Charlottetown; Daniel, British Columbia; and John, Boston.
The funeral, which was held from his late residence, to St. Anne's Church, Lot 30, on January 30th, was largely attended.
Requiem Mass was sung by the pastor, Rev. Charles McCarthy, who also performed the last rites at the grave, where all that was mortal of a loving devoted father was laid to rest. Assisting in the choir was Rev. Leo Herrell, a former pastor. Seated in the sanctuary was Rev. James Smith, Kelly's Cross.
Pall bearers were: Emmett Flood, Reginald Kelly, Clarence Curley, Owen Cudmore, Matthias Flood and Peter Clarkin.

Any Topping Of U. S. Budget Is Apt To Be Off Foreign Aid

WASHINGTON (CP)—The Eisenhower administration is embroiled in a buck-passing battle with Congress over the president's 1957-58 budget, the largest in peacetime U.S. history.

Many congressmen, Republicans as well as Democrats, say they are alarmed over the size of the budget—it totals \$71,800,000,000—and think it should be trimmed. The White House says it welcomes any cuts Congress can make but has no suggestions to offer.

Both sides are playing politics since both know it is virtually impossible to make any sizable reductions in a budget geared to the global cold war atmosphere and the heavy defense expenditure of the total, more than \$43,000,000,000 is earmarked for national security, which includes military spending and foreign aid.

If any cuts are made, and Congress is aiming at topping off at least a couple of billion dollars, it likely will come from foreign aid, for which the president is asking a \$4,400,000,000 appropriation. The budget debate was triggered when Eisenhower's own secretary of the treasury, George H. Humphrey warned that the budget might create a hair-curling depression and invited Congress to slice it.

Congress, unwilling to go out on a political limb, took the unusual step of asking Eisenhower, who already had approved the budget in its entirety, to say where it should be cut.

Eisenhower, playing his own brand of politics, passed the buck back to Congress by saying that if Congress wanted reductions, it would have to make them in such civilian programs as farm relief, school construction and veterans benefits—all areas in which he obviously knows Congress cannot cut back spending without incurring public disfavor.

The lawmakers have the backing of a sizable segment of the American business community which normally supports the Republican president but feels in this instance that the government is over-spending and contributing to inflationary pressures.

Colombia Foreign Exchange Problems Caused By Coffee

Colombia is going through a dollar shortage and Canadian and American exporters find they have to wait for payment for goods sold there.

The situation was discussed at this week's seminar in Toronto of the Canadian Exporters' Association and opinion seemed to be that there is not much to do about it except "wait and see."

Indications are that the matter will be worked out, but that it may take a little time.

It is estimated that about \$10,000,000 is owing to Canadian exporters of a wide variety of items—mostly consumer goods—and about \$200,000,000 to American exporters.

Accordingly, any arrangement in the Canadian situation may have to wait until the dollar is reached in the much bigger American one. However, it has been suggested to Colombia that in view of the relatively small amount of the Canadian bill, it might be settled without recourse to more complicated arrangements which may be necessary in the United States.

The difficulty arises, apparently, partly from a "poorish" coffee crop and some drop in prices, but more particularly from Colombia permitting more imports than she had the foreign exchange to pay for.

It became apparent last November when Colombia stopped allowing foreign exchange for payments for imports.

SUGGESTED SETTLEMENT
In January, Dr. Morales, the Colombian finance minister, came to New York and in conversation with American banks suggested a basis for settlement. Under his suggestion, 60 per cent of the debt would be paid in cash and 40 per cent in the form of 30-month notes, bearing four per cent interest, payable in monthly installments.

The banks, in turn, took the matter up with the American exporters concerned. Meantime, however, WI moral apparently understood that arrangements had been arrived at and made an announcement accordingly.

However, nothing had been signed and a variety of complications remain to be ironed out. For instance, the notes—those held by the banks and those to be sold by the government—must be approved by the United States Securities and Exchange Commission.

As C. K. Highmooor of the Canadian Bank Commerce commented on the matter to the Toronto seminar: "The whole picture is clarified but is still confused."

THE SEMINAR CHAIRMAN asked the audience how any firms represented were concerned in the Colombia situation. Ten hands were raised. It is understood that 30 to 40 Canadian firms are affected.

When the chairman asked how many would accept the 60 per cent cash—50 per cent in the proportion if it were offered in Canada, three hands were raised. However, when he asked how many would not accept it, no hands were raised.

A voice from the audience commented: "We want to know more about it."

Exporters who protected themselves under the facilities of the Canadian Export Insurance Corporation, are receiving 85 per cent if what is owing them six months after the Colombian buyer deposits its payment in Colombia and they get the balance after a year. Those who did not take out this protection presumably, for the most part, have to wait.

In the meantime, export business to Colombia is virtually at a standstill.

Armoured Recce Support UNEF

ABU SUWEIR, Egypt (CP)—Arrival of a Canadian armoured reconnaissance squadron to reinforce the United Nations Emergency Force doesn't mark the first Canadian fighting troops in the theatre.

Some of the 1,200 support men here from the start come from combat outfits and range from the base unit commander down.

Col. Mike Dare of Camp Borden, Ont., and Ottawa is from the armoured corps himself.

The camp commandant, Maj. Ivor Stewart of Kingston, Ont., and Ottawa is a gunner; the adjutant and quartermaster, Maj. W. A. H. Lee of Calgary, is from Camp Borden, is from the Strathcona tanks; the welfare officer, Maj. R. B. (Buz) Mainprize of Chilliwack, B.C., is from the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry; and his driver, P. Lie, an infantryman from Hamilton, Ont., is also an infantryman.
