THE LAST OF THE "MARCPOLO."—The sale of this far-famed clipper ship and cargo took place yesterday under the direction of Hon. C. W. Howland, Vice-Consul of Norway and Sweden, at the residence of Alex. McNeill, Esq., Cavendish Capes, and the day being fine, and the cargo a valuable one, there was a very large attendance indeed; in fact, we may say, that every town, village and hamlet from Alberton to Georgetown, was represented, and Quebec, St. John, Sackville, Moncton, Shediac, and Kouchibouguac, N. B., as well. The bidding was most spirited, and the competition keen, many being seemingly anxious to own something which belonged to the great packet ship whose fame, when the Black Ball line flourished was world-wide. The stores and outfits were sold in small lots to various parties, bringing good prices. The cargo, containing something over 600 standard Quebec pine deals and ends, was knocked down to Mr. Leantum, of St. John, N. B., and George McLeod, Esq., of the same place, at \$5,500, and the hull, etc., with masts and rigging alongside, went to Mr. Lantulum at about \$500. The total sales would gross about \$6,000. The auctioneer was A. McNeill, Esq., of this city, who appeared to discharge his duty to the satisfaction of everyone, and it is not too much to say that the underwriters may congratulate themselves for the handsome amount of the proceeds, which was due largely to his energy and perseverance in making the most of everything. Suspicious Circumstances.
ANTIGONISH, N. S., Aug. 9.
About two weeks ago, Ada Byard, colored, aged 20 years, deaf, dumb, and blind, living with her father about a mile from Guysboro, came to her death under circumstances which leave the impression that she was foully murdered. It appears the father went to town and on his return in the evening he found his wife had also gone away, and the deceased was nearly dead from wounds, as if inflicted with an axe. The only person at home with the deceased was a girl five years of age. The opinion prevails that the child is not the guilty person.

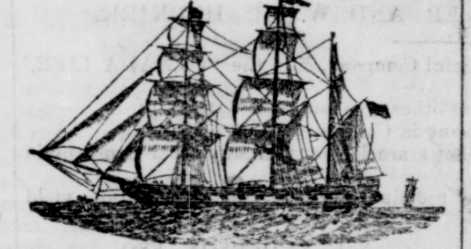
GRAND TEA PARTY ALBERTON.
