WASHINGTON, May 26.—"With regard to the invasion of Cuba," said Major-General Miles at the war department, "I have nothing to say except that the United States will in due time bring Cuba under its control by judicious methods and without a useless waste of life. The United States is too great, too strong and too powerful to commit any foolish act in connection with the proposed invasion. As for myself, I have only to say that no officer is fit to command troops who from any motive whatever would needlessly risk the life of a single soldier, either from disease or the bullets of the enemy."

## SPAIN SUED FOR PEACE.

The Proposal was Rejected

MADE BY RUSSIAN AMBASSADOR ON SPAIN'S BEHALF.

There will be no further Intervention by the Powers.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, May 27.—Spain has, through the Ambassador of another power sued for peace and the proposal has been promptly rejected by the United States Government.

Having no representative here, the Madrid authorities could not deal directly with the State Department. So the suggestion was personally made to Secretary Day by the Ambassador of another power in behalf of Spain. It was intimated that Spain would be willing to withdraw her troops from Cuba if the United States surrendered all other claim to the Philippines and would abandon the proposed seizure of Porto Rico.

Three European powers, Great Britain, Russia and Germany were interested in the proposition which was not, so far as can be learned, accompanied by any attempt to influence the position of the States.

In fact, it was simply in diplomatic language, an attempt to ascertain what conclusion would be given such an outcome of war.

The reply of the government was prompt and emphatic.

It was the Russian Ambassador who offered a suggestion of peace to be entered upon the present condition of affairs, and he was told that the proposal came too late and peace could not be granted or thought of until the freedom of Cuba had been accomplished and the occupation of Porto Rico is certain.

The ultimatum was proposed by President McKinley and verbally transmitted to the Secretary of State and was formally handed in writing to the Ambassadors of the three powers named and transmitted by them jointly to Madrid.

It can be asserted positively that there will be no further interference from the Powers until Cuba and Porto Rico have been seized.

Public opinion at Madrid is said to be anxious for some way to honorable peace.

## FRANCE FRIENDLY.

LONDON, May 26.—The Paris correspondent of the Standard says: "The report that negotiations have been opened for the transfer of the Philippines to France by sale or lease is absolutely false. The policy at present pursued by the French Government is to cultivate the most friendly relations with the United States. I have reason to know that the American Government has received assurance to this effect which leaves no room for doubt as to the intentions of France."

## A REPORTED SPANISH VICTORY.

American Ships Destroyed

AND ADMIRAL SAMPSON KILLED IN THE FIGHT.

No Particulars of The Engagement Are Given.

CITY OF MEXICO, May 27.—Telegrams have been received here by prominent Spaniards announcing that a naval engagement had been fought between Sampson's fleet and the Spanish ships in which the Americans lost every ship and Admiral Sampson was killed.

## TRANSPORT OF TROOPS.

Difficulty of Procuring Vessels.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 26.—As to the Philippines the acute stage has been reached. The Government will, if necessary, immediately impress into service vessels under American registry.

The Government of the United States is today determined, peacefully if it can, forcibly if it must, to put United States troops aboard boats at San Francisco, and to land these troops at Manila. Secretary of War Meiklejohn consenting to the use of his name, told me that the Government had every disposition to be reasonable and fair in its compensation for transportation of troops to the Philippines, but one thing might as well be distinctly understood, that these troops had to be taken across the Pacific, and put at the service of General Merritt. Mr Meiklejohn was disposed to admit every necessity for promptness that had for two days been pointed out by the Herald, and was frank to say that the question of the transportation had been the only one to embarrass him. The situation for the week showed that to the end of this week the transportation of only 7,100 troops had been provided for.
