How Is The Land Low temperatures and lack of sunlight have kept the land in poor condition for cultivation and the general commencement of cropping operations.

In the vicinity of Charlottetown the soil has dried up more rapidly than in the eastern and western parts of the province where little or no work has been attempted.

Present indications are that seeding will be later than for the past few years but this is no indication that crops will not be good. The chief reason for this is the fact that more time is left for the various other operations of the summer months.

This is the season of the year when many of our Educational Institutions are sending out graduates into the various walks of life. In most Maritime Universities the names of graduates will appear in the year book.

One of the important jobs facing farm people today is the matter of rural and urban public relations. It is our belief that in general urban people will be fair in their attitude to agriculture if the facts are properly presented to them.

The announcement coming from Ottawa that a three-way barrier deal in meat involving Great Britain, Canada and New Zealand has been arranged gives some indication that the difficulties which the Federal Government found in making its floor price policy on beef operative have been solved in part at least.

Clearly in the face of insufficient storage space and the absence of export markets, the Government had a real problem on its hands, a problem which might only have been solved by providing the consumer with a feast of cheap meat, a solution which would have been quite unfair to the farmer who, certainly should not bear the entire loss resulting from the outbreak of foot and

mouth disease. This outbreak is a national calamity and we do not think that the consumer wishes to benefit from it at the expense of the farmer.

The consumer has held the belief that food prices are very high but as a comparison we would like to quote some figures to show what one hour of the average workers time would buy in terms of different foods in April 1929 and April 1951-1952 is selected because it also was a year of high prices.

The hearing of the appeal before the Supreme Court of Canada from the decision of our Provincial Supreme Court on the Marketing Board case has been completed and those interested must now await what is hoped to be an early and final decision in the matter by the Supreme Court of Canada.

Whether the decision is favourable or unfavourable it will be equally important as the principle of the right of one government to delegate powers to another in fields other than agriculture is involved.

It would be both unwise and unsafe to predict what the decision will be but Canadian farmers directly have much at stake and will be hoping for a decision upholding the legality of marketing legislation.
