Horse Notes.

It is said that an offer of \$15,000 was recently made and refused for the California pacing stallion Almont Patchen, record 2.15, and that the horse has been driven a trial in 2.13 1/2.

The talk about what Susie B. is going to do this season has begun again. I will be remembered that when this filly made a three-year-old record of 2.20 in 1887 it was predicted that as a four-year-old she would lower the record of 2.16 set by Manzanita for trotters of that age, but the best that Susie B. could do was 2.18, which, although a very creditable performance, was a good way from that of Manzanita.

One of the fastest two-year-old trotters on the Lexington track this spring is a filly by Red Wilkes, dam by Happy Medium, and John Madden and the other bright young men of that town, who are always on the lookout for speed and precocity in horse-flesh.
