The Halifax Dominion Exhibition.

THE P. E. Island exhibit of Live Stock and other articles forwarded to the Dominion Exhibition at Halifax this morning, is estimated to be the most valuable cargo that the Steamer St. Lawrence ever carried to Picton landing.

The Live Stock Exhibit consists of thirteen stallions, seventeen geldings and mares, twenty-five head of cattle, forty sheep, and five coops of poultry.

Owing to the late harvest, the products of our soil will only be partially represented.

Among the articles forwarded are butter, cheese, wheat, barley, black and white oats, oatmeal, potatoes, potato farina, codfish, mackerel, herring, canned lobsters, chicory, timothy and clover seed, boneless codfish, boneless hake, haddock, salmon, etc.

In manufactures, Thomas Hall, Summerside, exhibits a threshing machine and fanning machine. Robert Smallwood, Charlottetown, a rotary saw mill, a shingling machine and jointer.

A large number of our leading citizens, interested in stock-raising, witnessed, on the Steam Navigation Co.'s Wharf, the live stock selected for the Exhibition.

STABBED.—Mr. Reid Lewis, of Tryon, was seriously stabbed by a young desperado named Dunbar McCabe, on Monday evening last. The stabbing occurred at the close of a temperance meeting, and was done coolly and deliberately, under the following circumstances: Mr. Lewis was driving in his wagon from the meeting when McCabe rushed from a crowd with knife in hand, and stabbed him below the left shoulder blade. Those who witnessed the assault were struck with amazement. They seized McCabe, and brought him before a magistrate who, after a short examination committed him to Prince County Jail, to await his trial in the Supreme Court. Mr. Lewis although very ill at present, will shortly recover. The cause of the assault is unknown.

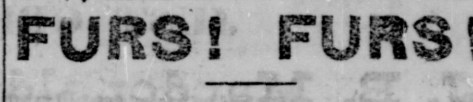
