Souris RHS Teacher Leaves For Europe, Near East Tour

SOURIS — Miss Sandra MacGregor, East River, and a teacher at the Souris Regional High School, will leave for a two-month tour of Europe and the Near East countries. Her trip will begin in Beirut, Lebanon, from July 15 and she will fly to London where the members of the tour will spend a few days. Next they will fly to Berlin and also see East Berlin by bus. Then they will proceed to Vienna, Austria, from where they will fly via Rome to Cairo, Egypt. There they will visit the Pyramids and the Sphinx.

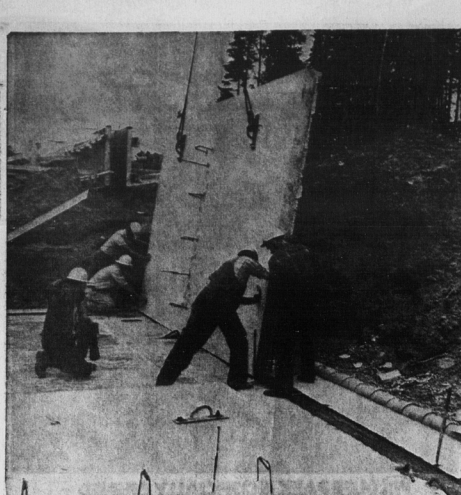

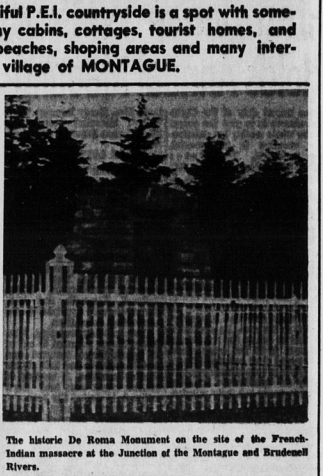
