Tanker to Make Run Here through Field

It was learned last night that after a delay of 10 hours, the Imperial Oil Company's "I. E. Simard" sailed from her Halifax harbor berth in Imperial at approximately 8 p.m. yesterday. The delay was caused by heavy winds and rough seas which pounded the Nova Scotia coast most of Friday as the result of a weather disturbance which was reported to be moving east from St. Lawrence early last evening and moving rapidly northeast. The Simard was originally scheduled to dock in Charlottetown around noon today, but with the sailing time delayed she will not berth until Sunday morning. Her cargo consisted of some 60,000 barrels of assorted heating fuels, for delivery to the company's local bulk storage plant. It was not known last night what course she will take from Halifax, but local officials said that if the weather remains to come through the Gut of Canso via the lock, she could be off this port in about 24 hours. But if she is forced to proceed around Cape Breton through the Cabot Strait, it will take close to 40 hours. Once she gets to the jetty off the Northumberland Strait, which is reported to reach east from Charlottetown to the vicinity of Cape Henry, the Simard is expected to pick up the jobbreaker CCGS John A. Macdonald, which will escort her to off Point Prim. From there the final leg of her voyage is likely to be made in the company of the CCGS Tupper.

A centralized course designed to bring candidates for adult trade training classes up to the grade level in English, science and mathematics, will have 72 persons, ranging in age from 16 to 20 registered by Monday.
