Deiving back into his ancestry it seems with speed, but there is another reason for his bettering his marks in that Don Turner has changed his shoeing considerably and he is now wearing a set of aluminum shoes on his front feet that weigh less than two ounces each.

James "Roach" MacGregor, who had a spectacular victory with Bay State Pat, owned by Andrew Perry of Summerside, at Quebec Raceway last week, arrived home by car Wednesday night and left yesterday morning for Blue Bonnets Raceway, Montreal. Roach speaks very highly of the treatment accorded him at all three Quebec tracks—Richelieu, Quebec City and Blue Bonnets. There are 700 horses stabled at Quebec Raceway and over 400 at Blue Bonnets, some of the latter are stabled out far as eight miles and a number are trucked over from Quebec City to race in Montreal.

Roach has Jo-Jo Spencer 2.09 1-5 record taken at Charlottetown Old Home Week—and the trotter Scotland's Ace 2.09, both owned by Andrew Perry, stabled at Quebec Raceway where they are being looked after by Dave Constable, who had some success with April Bud Old Home Week, marking him in 2.12, and at Blue Bonnets he has Bay State Pat, where he is being cared for by Everett Rogers.

Since going up to the province of Quebec Roach has been in the money every time he started with all his horses. In his first race with Scotland's Ace he finished 8-2, the latter dash in 2.12, and he was 2-2 with the same horse with both dashes in 2.11. Jo-Jo was 3-3-4 in his four starts and we all know the story of Bay State Pat's dramatic win when he broke the track record at Quebec City Raceway by pacing in 2.02 2-5. At the conclusion of that race Don R. Miller, Executive Vice President of the United States Trotting Association, accompanied by Frank L. Wiswall, Hon. Secretary of the U.S.T.A., Andrew Perry, owner, Lucien Bombardier, race secretary, Roach and Bay State Pat had their photo taken in the winner's circle where Mr. Miller presented Pat with a beautiful blanket.

Worthy of note is the fact that Bay State Pat's 2.02 2-5 is the fastest mile ever stepped by any trotter or pacer owned in Canada over a Canadian track. He was fourth going away and was behind the other starters when they hit the first turn, but was on top at the quarter pole, and was officially timed in 29 seconds. Roach's watch showed the mile in 2.01 3-5.

Bay State Pat was in the first division of a featured \$1,500 pace last Monday night and won in 2:06 3-5. Owing to the large number of starters the stake was raced in two divisions with a \$1,500 purse for each. The second division was won by Mighty Tarr, owned by C.A. Tarr, Putnam, Conn. and driven by Bucky Day, time 2:08 4-5. He had won at Foxboro a couple of weeks previous in 2:04. The track was heavy which accounted for the slower time.

Tonight at Quebec City Jo-Jo

opener will start and on Sunday afternoon Bay State Pat will be a starter in the \$7,500 free for all pace at Blue Bonnets, where many of the fastest pacers in Canada and several from the U.S.A. are entered. About ten are expected to start, among them Brave Scott 2.00, Scotch Dean 1.59 2-3, Dr. Home 2.05, H.B. Chief 1.59 1-5, Star Pola 2.04, L.E.M. 2.05 1-5, Star Volo 2.02 3-5, Thunderclap 1.59 4-5 and others. Andrew Perry has had numerous offers for Bay State Pat running into the five figures but is loath to sell the horse he likes so well.

Jean is owned by W.H. Robson of Albion, N.Y. The previous evening Joe O'Brien had won the A Trot, purse \$4,000 with Beck Hanover, owned by the S.A. Camp farms. Scott Frost 2, 2:00 has been insured by Sol Camp for \$100,000. The annual premium is \$5,000. The same amount is carried by owner W.H. Cane on his retired pacer Good Time.

At Indianapolis, Indiana, Sept. 8, the Hoosier Futurity (Two Year Old Trot, purse \$13,367) had 15 starters and was run off in elimination heats. It was won by Newport Dell, owned by Newport Stock Farms, and a full brother to Newport Star and Newport Dream, both of which won the Horsemen's Stake as 2-year-olds. Newport Dell won the first elimination heat in 2:06 1-5, 2:06 2-5, over, owned by R.J. In the race-off, Gratis was favored but Newport Dell, racing in second position, trailed the filly to the three-quarters and then went for her, taking over to win. Hunters' Corner

as the September days ticked off supple trout rod bend double and hear the whirr of the reel as I had to give a fighter more line. Mid afternoon on Thursday the fifteenth found me engaged in an argument with myself. Trouting conditions were ideal for the "back of beyond", as I have named it, and also there were duck concentrations I could keep an eye on in the evening dusk but—I couldn't keep an eye on them all supposing I could be in a dozen places at once. The argument with myself, ended then and there.

I felt the need of relaxation—the years at passing too swiftly to suit my fancy and in a few short hours another trout season would be beyond recall, so what! There was a lovely ripple and the sun shone brightly but—the trout were not co-operating. It was pleasant to sit in the boat and relax. With was lazy and un-effortful. Conditions were bound to improve and the trout could wait.

Time really didn't matter. In a setting like that there is always something to see or hear. A muskrat swimming lazily spotted the boat, stopped and gave me the once over with its tail crooked in a saucy curve, and then dipped gracefully under and was seen no more—six blue-wing teal skimmed by, banked against the spruce, and returned whence they came—a splash and a raven croaked in mournful protest at my invasion of his stamping ground as he bypassed me at a safe distance.

Suddenly a low cloud scud obscured the sun for a few moments and the trout came to life. A heavy trout swirled at the dark Montreal twice and on the third cast laid hold. I gave him the butt and he reeled 10 or 15 feet of line merrily off but as I applied the brakes the fly flipped into the air. He wasn't hooked solid. From time to time as local clouds obscured the sun there was action. The trout taken were not running large—about three to a pound—but fought like tigers.

I knew there were big trout on the prowl by the heavy swirls at the edge of a stable weed patch. They weren't having any today thank you. Once a big fellow got tangled up in the grass and flags and set a section of the bed rocking. A half pounder amused itself by curving in a graceful arc over my offering and on the third try hooked itself under a stick—back that was still alive. I had a bright idea and hooked a Streamer!

through its back. The first cast landed within a few feet of the weed patch. I let it sink and in seconds felt the solid tick tack on the line that indicated a heavy weight customer was sampling my wares.

When the line started to play out I set the hook. I felt the power of the trout for the few seconds the reel screamed and then it was all over—the streamer pulled loose but the stickle-back stayed. I hope he enjoyed it.

This was not Mr. Mitten's trout and for the benefit of those who have hooked and lost him he is still holding down his own special hangout and will be bigger and better next season.

I named him after the Rev. Mr. Mitten early this spring. He was just a beginner then at the art of fly fishing and knowing about beginner's luck I pointed out the hair of the old fighter. He came out to look the offering over three times but wouldn't strike. I advised

to let him wait until dusk. I figured he'd take hold then as indications showed he was in an edgy mood.

At keep dusk I moved the boat within range. An expert couldn't have placed the fly better. As it landed the bottom of the pool rose to meet it and I still have vision of a big open mouth showing and the water lashed into a churning foam. The rod was bent double as the angler held grimly to the butt with both hands. The old fighter refused to budge and there was only one ending in sight.

On the last evening of the season, after I had had my fill of trout fishing, two friends of mine in Charlottetown who had heard O.K. to try their luck. I stood on the side lines. One is an expert fly fisherman and has a six and a quarter pound trout to his credit. The other is not so experienced

and liable to crack under the strain of a heavy trout. I wondered whether Mr. Mitten's trout would be equal to the occasion. He was. He hit the fyro at the game and bent the rod double on the first lunge. He circled the boat three times with the speed of an express train and left a dazed fisherman sitting in the boat with a slack line.

They let things quieten down and then drifted the boat slowly with in casting range. Their lines snaked out until the cigarettes were a point of light in the blackness. Twice, maybe to show his contempt, he rose ponderously on business of his own, but he doesn't believe in being a sucker twice in the one night. A few nights ago another sharp caster coaxed two rises out of him. He stung himself on the third. Just enough to make the reel sing temporarily. Do you know I'm glad he's there for another season.

Jean is owned by W.H. Robson of Albion, N.Y. The previous evening Joe O'Brien had won the A Trot, purse \$4,000 with Beck Hanover, owned by the S.A. Camp farms. Scott Frost 2, 2:00 has been insured by Sol Camp for \$100,000. The annual premium is \$5,000. The same amount is carried by owner W.H. Cane on his retired pacer Good Time.
