

Report Record Attendance At Exhibition In Alberton

Delightful August we a brought another large crowd of visitors to the Prince County Exhibition at Alberton yesterday. Officials report that during the two days there was a record attendance. The dining hall, booths and canopies were well patronized, as were the amusement centres. As on previous occasions Burke's Pipe Band was greeted with enthusiasm and received the undivided attention of large numbers of adults and children alike.

In the afternoon the judging of livestock was concluded. Chief exhibitor in the carriage horse class was Willard Coughlin of Brooklyn, owner of the champion mare. In the draft horse class the champion mare was shown by Lorne Crockett of Montrose and the champion stallion by Ivan Wallace of Cascompec.

The Rose Bowl donated annually by the Canadian Bank of Commerce for the best three dairy females was awarded this year to Alvin Palmer of O'Leary, exhibitor in the Holstein-Friesian class. The champion heifer bull was shown by Keith Gard of Mill River. Junior male and senior female championships went to Alvin Palmer and the junior female championship to Ellen Smallman of Knutsford. Winners of special prizes offered by the Holstein-Friesian Association will be announced later.

In the hereof class all championships went to F. C. Ramsay of Montrose with the exception of the junior female championship which went to a new exhibitor, John McLeod of Summerside.

To encourage young exhibitors J. W. Campbell offers prizes each year for both registered and grade calves fed and cared for by boys and girls under 16 years of age. First and second prizes for registered calves were awarded to Ellen Smallman and Alden Remala. In the grade calf section they went to Mona Coughlin and Eric Phillips.

Prizes offered for best animals in show by D. L. Miller, owner of the Canadian Tire Corporation store in Summerside were awarded as follows:

NEEDLEWORK, HANDICRAFT

The exhibit of needle work and handicraft was the largest ever shown here and it received highest commendation from the judges. Mrs. Maylea Manning and Mrs. Willard Prowse. Assisting in judging were Misses Jessie Bingham, Virginia Matheson and Heather Coles. Mrs. Manning, who has judged at the Alberton Exhibition for some seven years, commented on improvements made in the prize list during the past year. Mrs. Manning and Mrs. Prowse, who also judged the domestic science, pronounced it to be of a very superior quality which would equal or surpass any exhibit shown in this Province.

It is quite impossible to comment on many of the eighty-seven exhibits in the handicraft class. The women of West Prince are noted for their skill in rug making and quilting. Among the display of rugs were beautiful specimens from the books of Mrs. Willard Duman of Alberton, Mrs. Isaac Dunbar and Mrs. William Mountain, both of Alma. One of the quilts attracting much favorable comment was one done by Mrs. Robert England of O'Leary R. R. in applique of tulip design in pastel tones of mauve, yellow, pink and green on a white background. There were also two attractive quilts in blue and white, the work of Mrs. George Ellis and Mrs. George Wood.

There was a large display of cushions with many kinds of workmanship, and a remarkable showing of crochet work and fine samples of tatting. Some attractive children's dresses were entered and for the first time there was a section for women's cotton dresses. Attractive women place mats of similar design were the work of Mrs. H. W. Matthews and Mrs. John McRae, both of Alberton, a child's dress, entered in the smoking section, was admired. It is the work of Mrs. S. R. Cameron of Alberton. There were good showings of both plain and fancy aprons, and of knitting.

It was pleasing to note special sections for the work of boys and girls and some good work was shown. Of particular interest was a Canadian product map made by Teddy Corbett of Summerside, formerly of Alberton.

SNAPSHOT CLASSES

There were a number of entries of snapshots, probably more than in previous years. Group of Highland scenes in color, by B. H. Turner of O'Leary, were very striking. The casual observer would be inclined to question the fairness of judging snapshots in color with those in black and white. Mrs. S. R. Cameron received first prize for her painting in water color, while first and second prizes went to Mrs. John Foley and Miss Martha Meyer, both of Bloomfield. A strictly amateur free hand drawing of Elmsdale United Church, done in water color by seventeen-year old Eric Hardy of Elmsdale, showed natural talent which one would like to see developed.

A specimen of aluminum etching by Mrs. Burton Boates and one of pottery by Mrs. Noy J. Moore could not be classified under the present prize list but both received favorable comment.

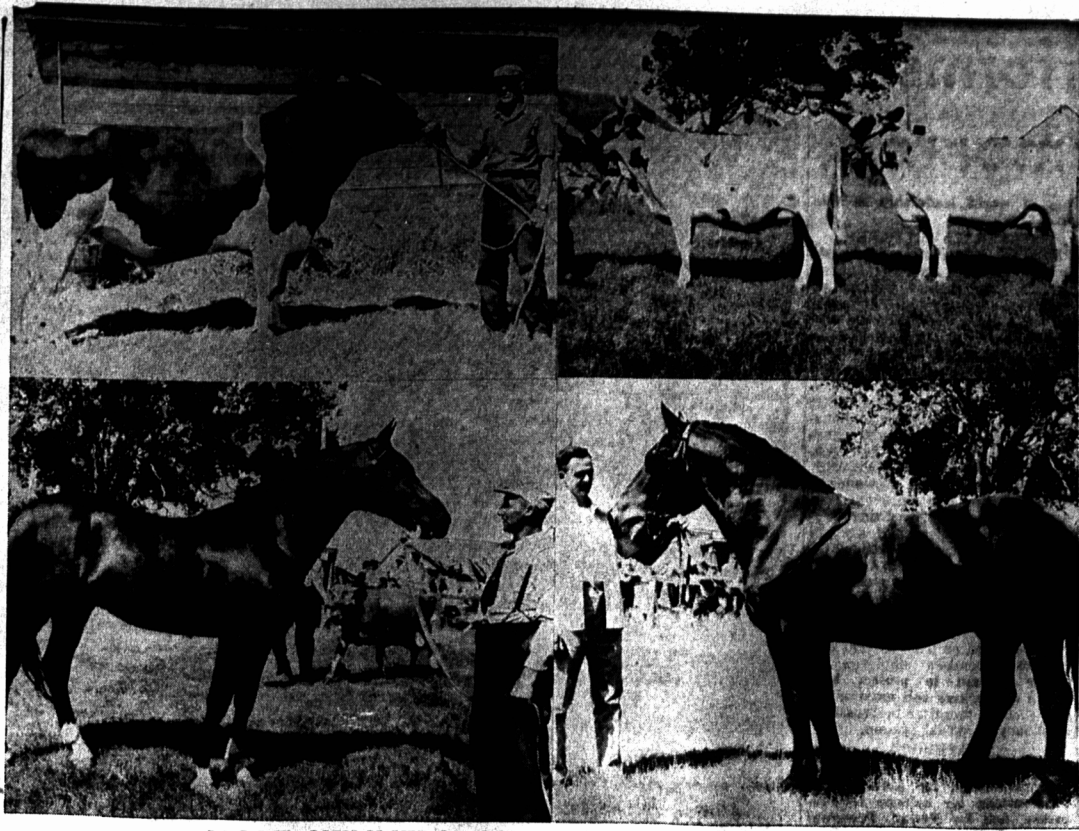
DOMESTIC SCIENCE

For the past few months the members of the Summerside Lions Club have been considering taking on the sponsorship of the Navy League Cadets in Summerside. At their regular supper meeting on Wednesday evening at the Birch Hall Tourist Home, King Lion Russ Kelly introduced Mr. Charles Hoggan, president of the P. E. I. Division of the Navy League of Canada who outlined to the club the responsibilities they would be undertaking and also the aims of the organization in promoting the Navy League Cadets.

The sponsoring body would bear part of the cost of the cadet uniform and the National Council of the Navy League of Canada would also assume part of the cost. The purpose of Navy League Cadets is to promote the mental, moral and physical well being of the boys in the age group 12-13 years. It is to help these boys to be good citizens by teaching them self respect and respect for others and also designed merely as a means of encouraging future enlistments for the Navy. Other items in the training agenda include squad drill, lectures, Morse code, semaphore, sports, as well as other worthwhile activities. The Navy League is promoting the cadet movement throughout Canada with 38 Navy League Cadet Corps in operation. A need was felt for an organization of this type for boys too young to join the Sea Cadets. After a question and discussion period the Lions Club decided to take on the project.

Mr. Hoggan in his remarks also referred to the high quality of assistance received from Lion Buddy D'Athe and his committee during the recent Lobster Carnival. Among the reports to the meeting was one from the sight conservation committee to the effect that the Lions Club had contributed materially in the case of a youth who had recovered his sight through surgery and now will be able to begin school this coming term.
