Annual Meeting Charlottetown Credit Union

The annual meeting of the Charlottetown Credit Union, Ltd., was held in the Board Room of the Credit Union, Co-op. Building on Thursday evening, October 24th with the president, Dr. J. H. Blanchard in the chair.

The reports of the directors, credit committee, and supervisory committee indicated a steady growth during the past year. The membership had risen to 136 with savings of almost \$10,800.00. This represented an increase of almost \$4000.00 over the previous year. 44 loans totalling over \$5100.00 were made to members during the current year. The present total assets amounted to \$11,395.66.

The secretary-treasurer, Major J. F. MacMillan, pointed out in his report that all shares and loans were insured by the Credit Union National Association by payments made from the earnings of the Credit Union and not as a direct charge on each shareholder. He also mentioned that 20 per cent of the net earnings were allotted to the Guaranty Fund, and 5 per cent to the Educational Fund. The total income for the year was \$512.73 and the total expenditure was \$303.27. A dividend of 1 1/2 per cent was declared.

Dr. J. H. Blanchard who was president since the society's inception in 1937, expressed a wish to retire from office. He expressed his thanks to the directors for their interest and devotion to duty during the past year. He was succeeded by the vice-president, Mr. Cletus Murphy.

Mr. J. J. MacIsaac, field man for the P. E. I. Credit Union League congratulated the organization on its successful year. He stated that the increase in savings was one of the highest for the year in the province.

Mr. MacIsaac then explained the new self-endorsement plan, a combination of savings and insurance as a means of making available more money to be loaned to the average individual for provident and productive purposes.

Mr. Benjamin J. Gallant of the Liguorian Credit Union offered many valuable suggestions to the members and stated that the increase of \$4000 in savings was most commendable.
