## INTERCOLONIAL EXTENSION.

Much Talk Regarding the Senate's Action.

Will the Whole Supply Bill be Thrown Out by the Upper House?

OTTAWA, June 25.—The defeat of the Intercolonial extension bill by the Senate and the course of the Government in trying to carry out the same purpose by placing an account in the supplementary estimates, is the principal topic on Parliament Hill. The only way the Senate can meet this last move of the Government is to throw out the whole supply bill, which would be a very extreme course, as whole rejection would leave no appropriation for public services next year. It seems uncertain how far Mr. Fielding's scheme will help out the Ministers, and other parties to the contract. A peculiar feature of the case is that the message brought down on Wednesday night, and signed by Lord Aberdeen, must have been procured from him before the Senate voted on the measure. It would seem that the Governor-General has been led into assisting in an attempt to overrule one of the Houses of Parliament.

When the Senate met yesterday Sir MacKenzie Bowell called upon the Minister of Justice to explain whether the Government proposed to disregard the action of the Senate and carry out, in another way, the scheme Parliament had objected to.

Sir Oliver Mowat said he had not seen his colleagues since the votes were taken. He felt sure, however, that the Ministers meant no disrespect.

Senator Miller said the government was simply acting in defiance of parliament and had brought about a crisis in the constitutional history of the country. He was prepared if the supply bill came to the Senate with this appropriation to advocate throwing it out altogether.

After further discussion Senator Ferguson said he was sure the Government would discover that it was not acting wisely but was giving an exhibition of bad temper. Until further explanations came he would not suppose a crisis was at hand.

In the House of Commons Hon. Mr. Foster asked for explanations.

In reply the government stated that it proposed to try the experiment for nine months of running over these railways, paying the same rate of rental as was proposed in the contract. If the experiment succeeded the objections of the members of the Opposition to the contract would be removed; if it failed, that would justify the action taken yesterday in the Senate.

## THE DRUMMOND COUNTIES RAILWAY,

Investigating Committee to be Asked For,

Which Will Include Senators Ferguson and McDonald.

OTTAWA, June 25.—An interesting notice of motion is given by Senator Miller. On Saturday he will move that a special committee of the Senate be appointed to enquire into the expenditure of subsidies granted by Parliament to the Drummond Counties railway, the present financial position of the said company, as well as its equipment, and also all other matters and things relating to the said railway, said committee to consist of Senators Bowell, Ferguson, Power, Scott, McDonald (P. E. I.), Deboucherville, Primrose, Cox, Landry, Prowse, Wood, Thibeau, and the mover. The Opposition members held a meeting yesterday to decide on a course of action respecting the new proposition to lease the Drummond Counties railway. It was decided to hear the explanations of the Minister of Railways and then decide upon the course of action.

Closing Exercises of the little Children.

Interested Audience at Kindergarten.

A large number of spectators was in attendance at Kindergarten Hall, this forenoon, to witness the closing exercises of the lovely young plants and flowers of humanity who have lately been growing up under the skilful cultivation of Miss Sayres and her assistants. All were delighted with the results exhibited. The discipline was perfect, and in all the exercises performed there were evidences of the wonderful effects of the natural processes of education intelligently applied even to very young children. The little ones who attend the Kindergarten play to learn and learn to play; and are thus having their bodily and mental faculties drawn out while they absorb a store of information that will be of the highest practical value. The rooms in Kindergarten are large, airy, bright and cheerful, and the young plants under every favorable condition. Several of the children gave short recitations in a highly pleasing manner, and altogether the exercises were indicative of the beauty and high value of Kindergarten methods. No prizes were awarded.

PARIS, June 23.—A dynamite cartridge was exploded yesterday evening in front of a cafe at La Grande Combe, 35 miles north, northwest of Nimes, in the department of Gard, where serious labor troubles have been in progress for some time past. Many of the occupants of the cafe were thrown to the ground, but no one was seriously injured.

BOSTON, June 23.—The Pan-American party reached this city early this evening, and after being assigned accommodations, was taken to Keith's theatre for the evening. The programme will include a trip down the harbor, with a visit to Lynn and an inspection of the shoe industries of that city; a return to this city in the afternoon and the partaking of a complimentary banquet at the Algonquin club by Mayor Quincy.

KINGSTON, June 23.—Dr. Viète, chief surgeon of the Cuban insurgent army commanded by General Garcia, arrived at Rio Buena, this island, on Saturday, accompanied by 11 Cubans. They had escaped from the province of Santiago de Cuba in an open boat and brought with them despatches for the Cuban Junta at New York. These despatches were seized by the Jamaican officials.

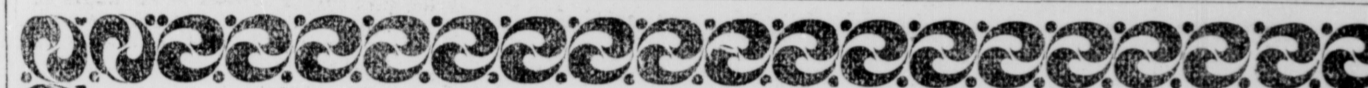
