The Railway.

No person who takes the trouble to compare the present with the past, can fail to note the marked improvement which has taken place in the P. E. Island railway and its management.

The roadbed and rolling stock is being continually improved; the rates and fares are being assimilated more and more to the circumstances of this Province and the interests of the people.

The improvements made during last session alone comprise:— New station houses at Bloomfield and Freetown.

New freight houses at Ellerslie and Alberton.

The enlargement and repair of four freight houses.

One flag station house rebuilt.

Three station houses remodeled and repaired.

Fourteen Haggis Elevators, placed at different points.

Four coal sheds enlarged and improved. Additions and alterations to coal shed at Charlottetown, and numerous repairs and improvements to station houses.

One thousand five hundred and seventy-five feet siding laid down.

Seventy thousand new sleepers laid on western section, and thirty-eight thousand new sleepers between Charlottetown and Georgetown.

A large number of culverts repaired and pointed with cement, and a large number of culverts renewed and covered over.

Thirty-five miles of track relaid.

The road bed repaired from end to end.

Two locomotive engines.

The passenger cars refitted and furnished with the Miller platform and vacuum brake.

This spring, the cars and other rolling stock of the road have been sent out of the workshops in a style very far in advance of what they ever were.

Already (as will be seen by the advertisements) arrangements have been made for the construction of a station house, etc., at Miscouche; and sixty-five thousand dollars are immediately to be laid out in the still further improvement of the rolling stock.

By comparing the freight rates of 1878 with those of 1882, it will be found that the following reductions have been made:

Muskel mud per 10-ton car, from \$9.80 to \$6.13—reduction \$3.67.

Brick per 10-ton car from \$9.83 to \$7.50—reduction \$2.33.

Lumber, salt, coal, iron, plaster, minerals—per car, from \$11.50 to \$9.00—fifty miles—reduction \$2.50.

Live stock, sugar, molasses, hay, hides, coal oil, earthenware, per car from \$24 to \$21—100 miles—reduction \$3.

Flour and meal from \$28 to \$22 per car—100 miles—reduction \$6.

Potatoes from \$25.50 to \$14 per car—100 miles—reduction \$11.50.

Cordwood from \$28.50 to \$17.50 per car—100 miles—reduction \$11.

And in like proportion, according to the distance, the carriage of these and many other articles.

A fatal accident happened at New Annan on Saturday, whereby a boy, son of Captain Kenneth Ellis, lost his life. The boy, who was only twelve years old, was in charge of a span of horses which took fright, throwing the little fellow out of the wagon, the wheels of which passing over his head, caused almost instant death. Much sympathy is felt for the parents.

Tuesday is nomination day, and it is anticipated that a large crowd will be in town, as the June term of the Supreme Court sits that day. In all probability the speeches of the candidates will be made in Ludlow Hall immediately after nomination.

On Monday last we were shown a broadcast seed sower just invented by Mr. John Dickson, of this town, which appears to merit attention. We were shown fields of both wheat and oats sown by it, and nothing could exceed the evenness of distance at which the blades appear above ground. The machine is very simple in its construction, and is consequently less liable to derangement than others of a more complicated build. The same seed-box will do equally well for sowing grass seed as well as grain; but there is a grass seed attachment added, so that grain and grass seed may be sown simultaneously. The machine can, however, be sold with or without the grass seed attachment. The quantity of grain or grass seed to the acre can be regulated at will, while an indicator shows the exact amount. By a very simple arrangement, the number of rows passed over is shown by an indicator for that purpose. In this way fields of whatever size or shape are measured in acres as well as sown with seed. This attachment can be thrown out of gear when required. Mr. Dickson, the inventor, is well known throughout the country by his fan mills. Farmers can examine the new machine at Mr. Calhoun's warehouse, near the station. A patent has been applied for.—Pioneer.

PRINCE COUNTY.

Meeting at Somerset.

Hackett and Rogers Supported by an Overwhelming Majority.

A mass meeting was held in Somerset Hall, Somerset, last evening. Addresses were delivered by Messrs. Hackett and Rogers, the Government candidates, and by Messrs. Yeo and Perry, the Opposition candidates.

Strong speeches, on behalf of the Government, were also made by Senator Howlan, E. J. Hodgson and G. W. Bentley, Esquires.

John W. Hughes, Esq., also spoke. Messrs. Hackett and Rogers were proposed by Peter Duffy, Esq., and seconded by John T. Murphy, Esq.

The nominations were carried unanimously. Messrs. Yeo and Perry were also proposed—the proposer and seconder only voting for them.

The meeting was enthusiastic and unanimous. Three rousing cheers were given for Senator Howlan, and three for the Government Candidates.

SUCCESSFUL MEETING AT OTTAWA.

SIR JOHN ENTHUSIASTICALLY RECEIVED AT HAMILTON.

Mowatt Floored on the Boundary Question.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

OTTAWA, June 9.

It is stated that Senator McPherson succeeds Sir A. T. Galt as Canadian Commissioner to Great Britain.

Hon. Mr. McKenzie is lying seriously ill at Markham. His condition gives rise to grave apprehensions. Medical men have been consulted. His friends hope he may recover so as to avoid the necessity of placing another candidate in the field.

Sir John McDonald met with a splendid reception in Hamilton last night from all the leading citizens. An address of confidence was presented to him by the workmen of that city.

The Liberal candidates from Ottawa called a meeting last night. The conservative candidates attended, spoke, and carried the meeting three to one. Mr. McIntosh called upon all the meeting, who agreed with him to stand up, and by this means showed the feeling of the meeting.

Mr. Dalton McCarthy and Mr. Mowatt, Premier of Ontario, met at Barrie, yesterday, and discussed the Boundary Question. Mr. Mowatt declared that the Government were trying to defraud Ontario of territory, at bidding of other Provinces. Mr. McCarthy, in one of the most telling and argumentative speeches, completely convinced the meeting that Mowatt was wrong.

Mr. McCarthy showed public documents as proof, but Mowatt had none. McCarthy carried the meeting two to one.

The Reformers admit Mowatt inferior to McCarthy as a debater.

The Patriot unceasingly prates about taxing the poor man's flour. It forgets that Alex. Mackenzie in a speech at Halifax said:—"Now, when your leaders come down here they declare, as Dr. Tupper did the other day, that a tax on flour would not raise the price one cent, and Dr. Tupper quotes me as an authority for that statement: "WELL I DO BELIEVE IN IT: I BELIEVE THAT NO TAX WILL AFFECT THE PRICE OF A COMMODITY OF WHICH WE PRODUCE A SURPLUS."

MONTRÉAL is in the midst of a peculiar educational crisis. The school boards, both Protestant and Catholic, have been badly smitten of late with the elaborate building mania, have spent all their funds on architectural adornments, and they now find themselves in a bankrupt condition. The result is that the teachers have received notice that their services will not be required after this month, and that the public schools will be closed on the 1st of August.

A TELEGRAM from Montague reports that the Grit meeting held at Murray Harbor North, last night, was carried in favor of the Government candidates.
