SUMMERSIDE — The Summerside Y's Men's Club was honored over the weekend at the annual convention of the Maritime Region Y's Men's Clubs in Charlottetown when presented with the Honour of Grimes Memorial trophy.

The award, donated for competition among Maritime Y's Men's Clubs by the Fredericton club in 1963, honors the club which has best demonstrated the ideals of the movement.

Mr. Grimes, who died in 1962, was secretary-treasurer of the movement since its inauguration in 1953 and during that time the international headquarters of the movement were in the basement of his house at Lawrence, Mass.

With 61 members, the local Y's Men's Club is one of the largest in the Maritimes and at its 26th annual meeting last year 23 of its past presidents were the meeting, most of whom are still active in the club. The club has also provided a number of international directors.

The local club's money making projects include the annual radio auction, Christmas tree sales, delivery of circulars and the bottle blitz. It also participates in the Lobster Carnival with other service clubs.

The service section of its program includes sponsoring and providing of leaders for five local Hi-Y groups, two Boy Scout and three Cub Scouts. It sponsors Red Cross swimming and water safety programs at Linkletter shore.

In young adult work the club has presented a 50-Ed program for the past several years.

It also participates in a world outlook program and gathers cancelled stamps which are sold to provide travelling expenses for overseas delegates to international conventions.

Contributions are made to the Paul William Alexander fund, established to assist young students training specialized university training to fill positions as club secretaries.

Navy Begins Recruiting Drive

The launching of a spring recruiting drive for officer cadets and seamen entries for the Royal Canadian Navy was announced today by Lieutenant N.B. Pakenham, RCN, area recruiting officer for New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

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1,500 Students In Montreal Boycott Classes

MONTREAL (CP)—Singing a Quebec version of the French revolutionary anthem La Marseillaise, some 1,500 suburban high school students boycotted classes Thursday demanding a holiday in honor of Dollard des Ormeaux.

The strike took place at Gerard Filion Roman Catholic secondary school in Jacques Cartier. Told after an hour's demonstration to choose either between home or classes, 900 students went home and 600 went to their desks.

Some students went to school in neighboring suburbs but to spread the word, and half the 350 students of Jean XXIII secondary school were reported to have stayed away from afternoon classes. Most of the 200 secondary students at St. Jean Eudes School also quit for the day at lunch hour.

About 150 of the 200 students at St. Hubert boys' school went home at 10 a.m.

All schools involved are French-speaking and Roman Catholic.

Dollard des Ormeaux died holding off Iroquois on the Ottawa River in 17th-century New France. Separatists who demonstrated in Montreal Monday demanded Victoria Day become Dollard Day.

Shell Oil To Spend Million On Pacific Ocean Oil Hunt

VANCOUVER (CP)—Shell Oil Company of Canada will spend \$1,000,000 this summer in its second year of an undersea Pacific Coast hunt for oil and gas. This is the only guide to the company's activities that is not as inquisitive about the major offshore projects as a program. The company will not say whether it has found any sign of oil and it hasn't been a drill within miles of the Pacific.

Dr. James B. Savage, geophysicist at the University of British Columbia, says there is no way for Shell to prove up any oil until it does sink a drill into the ocean floor.

He points to worldwide oil companies that promise Shell only a 20-per-cent chance of a strike even if geophysical instruments do find a site suggesting oil.

About the most active oil company in Canadian marine exploration, Shell has permits to explore 12,000,000 acres off the B.C. coast and 20,000,000 acres off Nova Scotia.

The federal and British Columbia governments are disputing ownership of offshore mineral rights, so Shell has covered its bets by taking out both federal and provincial exploration permits.

Shell is using four ships and about 70 men in the hunt. Vast quantities of explosives are involved.

In the first trip last year of the Shell Triton 10 tons of special marine explosive, lasted only two months.

While the blasting is going on John Lindsay, a federal fisheries expert, accompanies the fleet. He scans the water with radars before a shooting school.

CHINA GRANTS LOAN

NAIROBI (Reuters) — Communist China has agreed to grant Kenya an interest-free loan of 65,000,000 Swiss francs (about \$14,900,000). The Kenya news agency said Wednesday.

The loan will be given in equipment and technical assistance according to China's capability and Kenya's requirements from July 1 until June 30, 1969.

Rape Re-trial Enters 3rd Day This Morning

SUMMERSIDE — Four witnesses appeared and the testimony of another was read as prosecutor George R. McMahon completed his case in the second day of sitting of the supreme court re-trial yesterday before Mr. Justice R.R. Bell. The case is that of Cedric Frederic Bousheon of Minto, N.B., charged with the rape June 27, 1963, of a 16-year-old O'Leary girl.

Const. Frederick L. Connelley of the Summerside detachment RCMP testified concerning his investigation of the case, and the witness heard the testimony of two doctors, Dr. Thomas Moore of Summerside and Dr. George Dewar of O'Leary, as well as the testimony of the plaintiff herself.

The evidence given by Mrs. Janice MacKay, who is a lab technician at the RCMP crime lab in Sackville, N.B., which was presented at last November's trial was read by court prothonotary Gordon Holmes as Mrs. MacKay was in hospital and unable to be present.

Counsel for the accused, J. Melville Campbell called no witnesses and when the case resumes this morning at 10 o'clock Mr. McMahon will address the jury followed by Mr. Campbell and Mr. Justice Bell.
