TORONTO (CP) — The Beatles, mop-haired English rock 'n' roll group, will perform at Maple Leaf Gardens here Labor Day, Sept. 7.

A report says they will receive \$20,000 for the night stand.

Their performance here will be part of a tour that takes the group from the United States west coast in August and ends late in the fall on St. Sullivan's observation show in New York.

Competing with the group for the entertainment dollar on the same night will be United States comedian Jack Carter and Irish singer Cathel Corbett.

They will be features of the Canadian National Exhibition grandstand show.

The CNE will run this from Aug. 21 through Sept. 7.

### Sellers' Health Said Improving

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — British actor Peter Sellers will get off the critical list Friday at Cedars of Lebanon Hospital where he is under treatment for a severe heart attack.

"His condition now is listed as serious—and that's a big difference," said a hospital spokesman.

"He's getting minimal doses of the drug which is dissolving the blockage in his heart," the report added. "But we'll probably keep him in the intensive care room for another two days."

# Armed Terrorists Raid Montreal

## Are Located in Montreal

### Three Men Arrested, Others Being Sought

MONTREAL (CP)—Police announced Friday they have recovered almost all the arms stolen in a terrorist raid on a Shawinigan, Que., armory Feb. 20.

Joseph Brunel, director of the Quebec Provincial Police, said all the arms except three revolvers were recovered in an early Friday raid on a garage in north-end Montreal.

Recovered were 34 FN semi-automatic rifles, 3,200 rounds of FN ammunition in 1964 magazines, three portable radio receivers, a radio transmitter and army uniforms, police said.

The big break in the case came Thursday with the arrest of three persons in a car stopped at a road block about 40 miles south of Montreal, two hours after a bank holdup in Montreal.

Police said material used specifically to clean semi-automatic rifles, a roll of crans and terrorist squads were found in the car.

TWO IDENTIFIED  
Director Brunel identified two of those arrested as Jean Gagnon, alias Berube, 27, of Montreal, and Jean-Louis, 22, of suburban Outremont.

The name of the third individual, who first told police in Montreal for questioning Thursday night by OPP, RCMP and Montreal anti-terrorist squads set up after the Fusillers Mont-Royal robbery in Montreal Jan. 30 and an armory holdup in Shawinigan, Que., 75 miles northeast of Montreal, was not disclosed.

Following interrogation, two police conducted a series of raids and found the Shawinigan arms packed in three tarpaulin-covered army crates in a La Roche street garage. Police said two persons arrested there may have used the garage for sleeping in a stolen tax.

## Serious Water Main Leak Poses Problems For City

Somewhere in the Charlotteville area, there is a 3,000,000-gallon lake, and it is growing by 120,000 gallons every hour.

The pressure in city water mains is normally about 50 pounds, but a recorder located in the Water Works building on Queen St. showed that at one o'clock yesterday morning, the pressure had dropped to 22 pounds.

The drop was first noticed at 6 a.m. and department superintendent, Oliver Manuel, was notified immediately. Mr. Manuel realized what had happened and work crews were summoned.

Three pumping stations The city's water needs are supplied by three pumping stations, which in turn feed the reservoir. The stations at Union Rd. and Brackley Point Rd., feed the reservoir only. The station on Malpeque Rd., feeds a line in Malpeque Road as well as the reservoir.

The Water Department first closed off the line feeding the reservoir, in the hope that the pressure would ride back to normal. Crews then followed the line from the station to the reservoir and found no indication of a break.

An appeal was then made to citizens of the city to report any large concentration of water and crews spent the remainder of the day checking on these reports.

A survey of hydrant pressures in various parts of the city was made and the department is in its search.

TAKE NEW APPROACH  
Crews who had been up since six a.m. yesterday last night at midnight started to shut off water in various sections of the city in an effort to locate the big leak.

The department normally pumps some two million gallons of water for the city daily. At nine o'clock last night, the figure was in excess of five million.

This means that the leak is a three million gallon leak, and is increasing at the rate of 120,000 gallons each hour.

THAW HAMPERS SEARCH  
With the normal spring thaw in progress, detection of the leak is not easy, if the public makes making ridiculous and inflammatory remarks. Many of their statements were serving only to reduce the efficiency of the search.

### Officials Dismiss Hail Expected Traffic A Borden

Methods of handling the heavy traffic expected this year on the Borden-Tormentine ferry service were discussed yesterday at Borden. Attending a meeting were railway and government officials.

The heavy traffic expected will include not only passengers and vehicles but railway cars as well.

A number of other problems were discussed, including the need for a new dock, how best to arrange ferry schedules, methods of handling vehicle traffic on arrival during heavy season, a later trip during the winter and related subjects.

The new dock at Borden is not expected to be in use before late July.

The meeting began at 10 a.m. and carried on into the afternoon.

Traffic problems are complicated because of the large amount of railway freight known to be scheduled to move. Included in this are 3,000 extra cars of gravel, heavy point shipments, larger quantities of

lime, feed, cement and other commodities.

ARRIVE FOR OVERHAUL  
The MV Abegweit is to dry dock about April 22 and to be away six weeks. In the meantime the SS Prince Edward Island and the SS Scotia have to handle all rail freight which is now estimated to total, including empty refrigerator cars for potatoes and empty box cars, more than 10,000 cars in the next three months.
