THE SHIP-WRECKED ISLANDERS

Given a Hearty Welcome—Band Music and a Procession.

The six Charlottetown merchants who were wrecked on the steamer Labrador near Skerryvore light about a month ago, returned to their homes yesterday, and the glad hand of fellowship is being extended to them on all sides and by all persons. Everyone is pleased to see them back again, and to know that, notwithstanding their rough experience, they are all in excellent health and spirits. The party, with a number of friends who went down to Georgetown to meet them, came to Charlottetown about 4:15 yesterday afternoon by special train. The arrival of the train was signalled by the exploding of torpedoes placed upon the rails, the blowing of whistles, the ringing of bells, and in other ways, and hundreds of people were at the station and in its vicinity to meet and greet the returning Islanders. After landing, and receiving the congratulations of their friends, the party were escorted to barouches, Galbraith's band, which was in waiting, playing the National Anthem. Then the procession started, the band leading the way, and the principal streets of the city were traversed before the members of the party were taken to their respective homes. They brought with them many interesting souvenirs of their experience, the circumstances connected with which must linger long in their memories.

McDuff, and then a discussion on the subject, "Which is the better policy for Canada, Free Trade or Protection," will follow.

SCHOOL BOARD.—The regular monthly meeting of the City School Board was held last evening. The teachers' reports show the enrollment for March to be 1,366—805 boys and 561 girls. A communication from the Women's Council was read calling the attention of the Board to the large number of boys and girls of school age to be found in the public streets and elsewhere during school hours and urging them to procure such an amendment of the school law as shall convey to them power to compel parents to send their children to school. Messrs Stewart and McLeod were appointed a committee to confer with the Mayor and chairman of the City Council with regard to the matter.

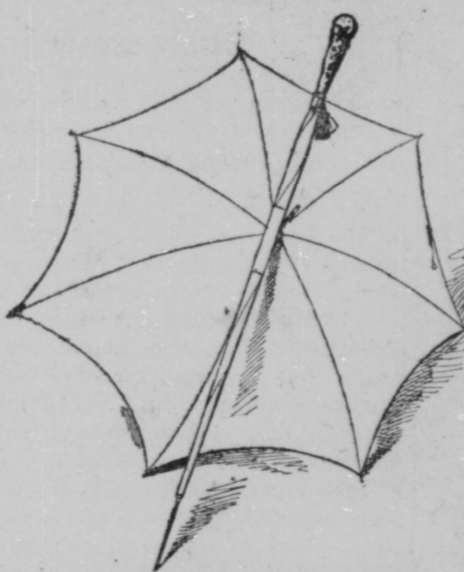
NATURAL HISTORY SOCIETY.—Mr. Newson was the lecturer at the meeting of the Natural History and Antiquarian Society last night—his subject the nebular hypothesis of the formation of this globe, which was treated in a lucid and masterly manner.
