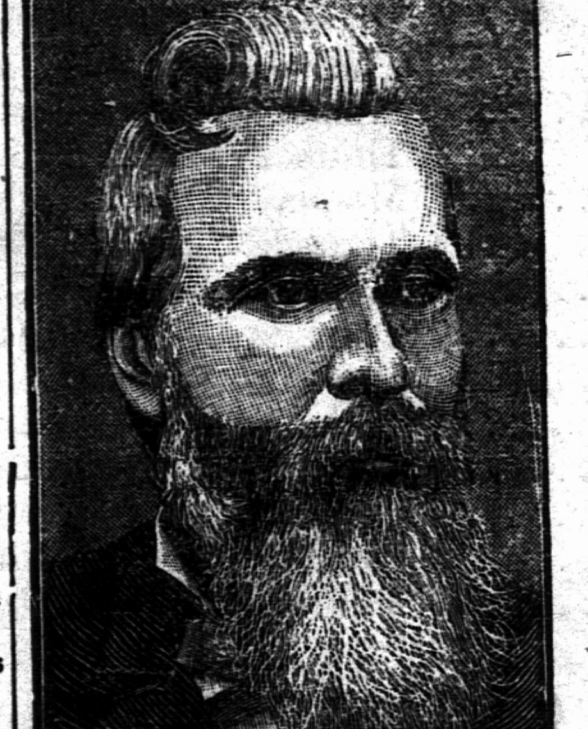

TRAGIC AFFAIR AT HALIFAX.

A Young Journalist, Son of Senator
Dickey, of the Ottawa Cricket
Team, Commits Suicide.

The Old Sad
Story.

HALIFAX, August 7.—The cricket tour-

namment had a tragic ending last night

when Frederick Stewart Dickey, one of

the Ottawa team, blew his brains out in

his room in the Queen Hotel. Dickey

played in the Ottawa's match against the

Halifax team on Wednesday and Thurs-

day, but some of the members of his own

team criticised his play of Thursday and

in the Canadian capital's match with the

Philadelphians on Friday and Saturday he

was replaced on the team by G. S. Flem-

ing. Dickey had been drinking hard pre-

viously to this but he became very much

depressed over his displacement and in-

dulged recklessly Saturday evening.

He had made arrangements to leave by

the 7.45 train for Amherst to visit his

family. He paid his hotel bill and went

in to tea at 6. After he went to his room,

sat down on a chair and putting a

revolver to his temple, fired two shots.

Persons rushing into the room found Dick-

ey lying on the floor, his face distorted, his

brains oozing out and the blood pouring

from the bullet hole. He was alive but

unconscious and soon passed away. An

immense crowd gathered about the hotel

and the excitement was intense.

An inquest was held last night and the

verdict was temporary insanity. Dickey

was about 37 years of age, son of Senator

Dickey and brother of A. R. Dickey, mem-

ber for Cumberland county. He has

been for some time endeavoring to get on

the civil service at Ottawa. It is un-

derstood his brother had about succeeded in

getting him there. The remains will be

taken to Amherst for interment tomorrow.

Dickey's comrades were just preparing to

leave for home when the suicide was com-

mitted and it created great commotion

among them.

The young man was a universal favorite,

and admired for his warm-hearted dis-

position by all who knew him. He studied

at King's college and began his crick-

eting there. For some years he has been

engaged in journalism in Toronto and

Ottawa, occupying a position at one time

on the Empire. He is a son of Senator

Dickey, a brother of A. R. Dickey, M. P.

for Cumberland county, and a nephew of

Colonel C. J. Stewart, of this city. His

father is now on the way from Britain

and will not know of the tragedy for

some days.

Artillery Competition.

THE SCORES IN THE FIRING CONTESTS—THE

SHIPPING RECORDS.

HALIFAX, Aug. 7.—In the artillery

shifting competition at Point Pleasant,

Montreal did the work in 21 minutes 55

seconds, Sergeant Major Gibbs' detach-

ment of Halifax did it in 16 16, and Cap-

tain Maxwell's Halifax detachment in 14

35. Twenty minutes is the time limit

and points are given according to the ex-

cellence of the work, not solely for best

time. The totals for the firing in the 20

pounder class are:

No 2 battery, Quebec.....43

No 1 battery, Lewis.....27

No 2 Lewis.....6

No 1 battery, P. E. Island.....27

No 2 ".....11

No 3 ".....46

No 4 ".....25

In the 64 pounder firing the results

were:

No 2 battery, Quebec.....70

No 1 " Lewis.....28

No 2 ".....33

No 1 " P. E. I.....19

No 2 ".....24

No 3 ".....62

No 4 ".....33

The score of Gibbs' team in the shift

was 235, that of Maxwell's 245. Montreal

had previously made 235, subject to a

deduction for having exceeded the time

limit.

The Island team has probably not im-

proved on any of the above shifts, other-

wise we should have received a despatch

last evening.

Ferdinand Ward to be Married.

street, who recently bade adieu to Sing-

Sing, is engaged to be married. Ward

has sumptuous quarters at the Champion

once the owner. He drives daily over

here to spend the time with his betroth-

ed. Ward's fiancée is 23 and very pretty.
