No Proof Of Jurisdiction Forces Case Adjournment

Contenting that there had been no evidence to the effect that the offence had taken place in the county under the jurisdiction of the magistrate, John P. Nicholson asked that the charge of having care and control of a motor vehicle while his ability was impaired by alcohol against his client, David Leonard Gallant of Charlottetown, be dismissed following the hearing of evidence in Queens County magistrate's court yesterday.

Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C., adjourned the case until May 4 at 4 p.m. advanced summer time, so that Mr. Nicholson could prepare a brief to support his statement. The Crown was represented by Crown Prosecutor, Allan Scales.

Evidence of the arresting officer revealed that he had followed the accused for some distance after seeing him pass another vehicle on a solid white line. He said that while he was following him the accused's vehicle straddled the white line several times and also forced an oncoming vehicle to take to the shoulder of the road to avoid a collision.

He said he caught up to the accused's vehicle near the Charlottetown Motel and finally stopped him near the RCMP barracks. He said he could smell an odor of liquor on the accused's breath and also found a bottle of ale in his vehicle.

In another case before the court, a fine of \$25 and costs or 30 days was imposed on Ernest Alphonse Bagan, Donagh, when he pleaded guilty to a charge of having the unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor not purchased at a vendor.

OVERWEIGHT — Driving an overweight vehicle cost John Angus Nicholson, Montague, a fine of \$20 and

costs or 15 days. Evidence revealed that the vehicle had been 11,450 pounds over the limit.

Two persons were fined \$10 plus \$1 for a license when they pleaded guilty to separate charges of fishing without a license. They were Terrence Eugene Arthur Solomon, Souris and Levi Lewis Corriveau, SDU.

An accused paid a fine of \$20 and costs or 15 days when he pleaded guilty to having the unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than his residence.

IN TRAFFIC SECTION — In the traffic section of the court Lester Seidon Jenkins, Summerside, was convicted of driving 60 m.p.h. in a 40-mile zone, and fined \$20 and costs.

Mr. Jenkins had been summoned to appear in court April 6, but on that day was absent. Const. Robert McCann of the Charlottetown detachment RCMP testified that he had served a summons on Jenkins personally to appear in court yesterday, but he was again absent. The court proceeded ex parte and convicted him as charged.

Magistrate Adjourns Rape And Forgery Cases, May 4

The case of Dewar MacDonald, arraigned on a charge of forgery, was remanded to Friday, May 4, by Magistrate A. J. Haslam in city police court yesterday.

The hearing for Milton Doucette, charged with rape on a remand from April 23, was set for Friday, May 4.

The court heard evidence for the defence in the case of Herbert George, pleading not guilty to possession of liquor in a place other than his residence. Decision on the case was set for May 2.

Cecil Thomas Stymest, Mur-

ray River, pleaded not guilty to a charge of care and control of a vehicle while intoxicated. His crown and defence evidence were heard yesterday, with a decision set for Wednesday, May 2.

Ronald Woodgate, charged with being drunk and disorderly, was sentenced to 30 days. Joseph Anthony Theriault, arraigned on a similar charge on complaint of his wife, Olive Theriault, had his case adjourned to Saturday, April 28.

Arthur S. Gallant, charged with driving while intoxicated, pleaded guilty to the lesser charge of driving while impaired, and was fined \$125 and costs or 30 days.

Frank Clow, pleading guilty to driving a truck with an uncovered load of rubbish, thus constituting a nuisance, was fined five dollars and costs or two days.

An accused, pleading guilty to driving a vehicle with more than three persons in the front seat, was fined \$10 and costs or five days.

Of seven persons charged with being drunk and incapable, three were fined \$20 and costs or 10 days, three were sentenced to 30 days in jail, and one was fined \$10 and costs or five days.

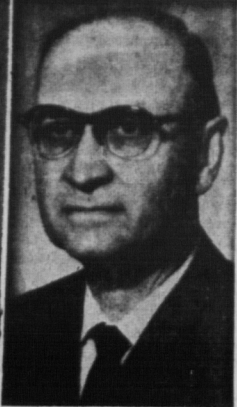

Music Festival Opens Monday in 3 Centres

The P.E.I. Music Festival which begins next Monday, April 30 and runs through May 5 will be the largest in the history of the province.

Mrs. Wendell Wood, secretary of the music festival said earlier this week "it may well prove to be the biggest one, musically, in our festival history". In addition to the 300 entries in solo and choral speaking, there will be 2,700 entries heard concurrently in Charlottetown, Summerside and Montague.

Adjudicators for the week-long festival are David Griffiths, Mrs. Mossie Hancock, Lloyd G. Queen, George A. Smale and Mrs. Olive MacDonald.

The sessions of the festival will be held in Queen Charlotte High School, Birchwood High School and Notre Dame Academy in Charlottetown; Civic Auditorium and Elm Street School in Summerside, and Montague Regional High School in Montague.

The music festival, an annual event, formerly contained also the newly formed P.E.I. Dance Festival, which held its first sessions as a separate organization earlier this month. The dance festival is now a separate body from the music festival.

The music festival each year draws a large number of entrants and an equally large audience. The program is designed to be of interest to instructors and competitors as well as the audience. Island talent in many forms will be displayed in this great event.

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Mrs. Olive Guthrie MacDonald, B.L.I. PTCL, of Halifax, (above), will adjudicate the choral reading and speech classes in the annual P.E.I. Music Festival. She has taught speech classes at St. Francis Xavier University and St. Bernard College, Antigonish and headed speech department of Maritime Conservatory, Halifax. She has been active in broadcasting both on the CBC and Radio Station CJCH, Halifax, and is well known as an actress on the Maritime Farm Broadcast as "Maggie" in "The Gillians."
