Missionary Work Outlined At Baptist Church Session

Nearly 70 people of the congregation of First Baptist Church took part in a one-day missionary workshop which was held Saturday. Taking part in the workshop was Rev. Maurice Bollat and Winston Steeves.

Mr. Bollat spoke on La Bonne Nouvelle Mission in Moncton of which he is co-director as well as pastor of the French Baptist Church in Moncton.

He said that there were a number of ways in which the mission was able to make contact with the French people of the Maritimes. They were by letter, by a personal visit and by radio. La Bonne Nouvelle Mission broadcasts over a fine radio stations which includes CFXY which by far covers a wider area than any other station.

Steeves spoke on the work of the Baptist Home Mission Board of which he was chairman for a number of years. He spoke particularly of the work of the board in the program "Church-Home Committees". Mr. Steeves said that less than 15 years ago there were no Baptist churches in Newfoundland. Today there are four churches—in St. John's, Cornerbrook, Stephenville and Argents. These

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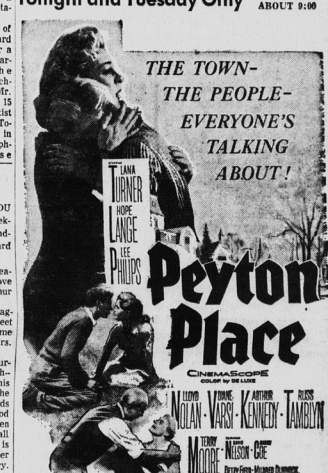
