Noted Evangelist Here On Sunday At Trinity Church

The Rev. Charles B. Templeton, noted evangelist, will be heard at Trinity United Church, Charlottetown, at all Sunday morning and evening services at 11 a.m. and 8 p.m. during July and every night at 8 p.m. July 24th to 28th.

A gifted speaker, the Rev. Charles Templeton after spending three years in evangelistic work in United States and Canada, established and was Minister of Avenue Road Church, Toronto, where three thousand two hundred people attend the two services held on Sunday evenings.

Immediately after the war, Mr. Templeton toured twelve European countries in the interests of evangelism. On Easter Sunday morning 1949 he spoke in the Rose Bowl, California to 40,000 people and also broadcast from coast to coast.

The Board of Evangelism, United Church of Canada, states, "He is an evangelist par excellence—has a warm and decisive message" and, "is one of the most gracious Christian characters we have met."

His wife, Constance O. Templeton is a gifted singer, won the California Hour Vocal Contest, was soloist at the Pasadena Rose Bowl, and has sung in almost every state in U. S. A.

JOHN ARCHIBALD MacLEOD

The death occurred in the Prince Edward Island Hospital on May 28th, 1950, of John Archibald MacLeod, after a brief illness. The late Mr. MacLeod was born at Glasgow Road on May 30th, 1890, the son of the Angus and Christina MacLeod, in which district he lived for the greater part of his life.

By his faithful and winsome personality, and through his honourable dealings with his business associates, he gained a wide circle of friends who held him in the highest esteem. He was always interested in his home, Church and community life. He was an adherent of the Presbyterian Church, Glasgow Road and upon his removal to Charlottetown became a communicant member of Zion Church.

On July 22nd, 1914, he was united in marriage to Miss Sadie Coles of Glasgow Road. To whom were born a family of ten children, all of whom are living. Those who mourn his passing include his devoted wife and his family, Tillie, (Mrs. Raymond Andrew) Glasgow Road; Dan on the home farm; Fred, Parkdale; Emerson and Claude, Glasgow Road; Allison, Leitha (Mrs. Robert MacKenzie), Ann (Mrs. Art Campbell) of Charlottetown; Luella and Carl at home; his mother, Mrs. Angus MacLeod of Charlottetown; and two sisters, Mrs. Frank Coles, Nahant, Mass., and Mrs. Roy McGee, Charlottetown. Two brothers, Alexander and Roderick, predeceased him.

The funeral service was conducted by Rev. G. Carlyle Webster, assisted by the Rev. Donald Nicholson, Brookfield, in Zion Presbyterian Church on Saturday, May 27th. Interment was made at the Peoples Cemetery.

The pallbearers were Messrs. Alex. MacRae, Frank MacRae, Wes. MacDonald, John MacDonald, Frank Roberts and Angus MacKinnon.

Wednesday evening a banquet was held in Pitts Memorial Hall, where for the first time in history, over four hundred members of the L. O. B. A. and L. O. A. of the ten provinces sat down together as one great Dominion. Distinguished guests occupied the head table, and Hon. O. L. Vardy, M. P. F. was chairman for the occasion. Numerous toasts were proposed and responded to, M. W. Loftus Reid, Grand Secretary, proposed the toast to the Province of Newfoundland, to which Hon. J. F. Smallwood, Premier, responded.

R. W. Mrs. F. Clouter, Provincial Grand Mistress of Newfoundland, very fittingly proposed a toast to the Grand Lodge of British America, L. O. B. A. This was most graciously responded to by M. W. Mrs. Margaret Scott of Toronto. A fine musical program was also listened to, especially two beautiful solos given by Mrs. Gennery of the Salvation Army.

A sight-seeing tour was arranged for Friday afternoon, which included Cabot Tower on Signal Hill, five thousand feet above sea level, this was a never-to-be-forgotten thrill, especially to the delegates from Prince Edward Island, where the highest points are only miniature hills in comparison to the mountains of Newfoundland.
