Captain And Crew Survive Fire At Sea

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Aug. 26 — (Cep) — Capt. Frank Collins, who has cheated death in four Atlantic disasters, tonight told how he and his hardy crew survived the fiery shipwreck Sunday of the Newfoundland schooner James Jones.

"But this doesn't change things between me and the sea," he told reporters. "I'll go back as soon as I get another ship beneath me. "Sunday was a perfect night at sea and we were heading north with a load of lumber and oil drums. Our position was about 40-nodd miles east-northeast of Cape Bonavista.

"Then a fire started in the engine room and we lowered a boat and drew away. We hardly got clear when explosions—I guess they came from the oil—heaved the Jones apart amidships and soon the flames were hundreds of feet in the air. Everything was hid by the fire.

"We rowed all night and after being adrift about 18 hours we reached Cabot Island. The light-keeper looked after us there. You know, it was funny none of those planes or boats saw us. Once we rowed like the dickens when the plane circled over but I guess they didn't see us."

Mystery shrouded the disaster until the five survivors identified the vessel, first reported by a Pan-American Airways pilot crossing the ocean.

On Thursday, the coastal freighter Blue Prince, found only a charred smouldering hulk about 70 feet long when it reached the scene. It sank before boats could be lowered to investigate.

The James Jones was owned by Atlantic Shipping Co. Ltd., of St. John's.

Individual Radios For P. E. I. Hospital

At a meeting of the trustees of the Prince Edward Island Hospital yesterday afternoon, an agreement was entered into with a Montreal firm for the installation of small radios of special construction to be attached to each patient's bed. The machines, 200 in number, will be set up today and are operated on a dimmer-hour basis, with a cut-out when not in use.

The speaker is concealed under the patients pillow and may be muted to subdue any sound beyond the immediate area. There will be no noises in the hospital, as a result of the installation.

To Hold Course In Community Drama

Preparations are going ahead for a course on "Community Drama" to be held in Charlottetown next week, Sept. 2nd to 6th, inclusive.

The course is being conducted by Mr. Michael Meiklejohn, B.Sc., M.B.E., of Ottawa, who is on the staff of the Physical Fitness division of the Department of National Health and Welfare.

An exceptionally helpful and interesting program has been outlined. Morning and afternoon sessions are devoted to stagecraft, play direction, and organization; while evening sessions cover practical direction and acting.

On Tuesday, the opening session (8:45-12 noon) features organization in the group, and stagecraft. Two films "On Stage" and "Simple Staging" will be shown. Afternoon session will be devoted to the making of a model stage.

Reading and Analysis of the Play" is the topic for the evening session. Wednesday's daytime sessions cover the topics "Choosing the Play and the Director," "Choosing the Cast," "Stage Settings" and a film showing of "Simple Staging."

The evening's program centers "Planning the Production and the main moves."

On Thursday, "The Director's Preparation of the Play," "Principles of Grouping and Movement," "Construction of Scenery," "Making a 3-piece screen" and a film "One Way to Make a Flat," will all be covered during the day class.

In the evening "Practical Blocking of the Play" is the topic. Friday morning, "Early Rehearsals," "Costume and Color" and a film entitled "Making a Theatrical Play," all should prove of very practical help. The afternoon session will be devoted to "Make-up" and demonstrations, while in the evening "Detailed Moves," "Motivation and Characterization" will carry along the rehearsals of "Eros at Breakfast," which has been chosen as the play to work on during evening classes.

Saturday morning's program features "The Actor in Rehearsal" and "Organization Back Stage." During the afternoon "Stage Lighting" will be the main topic, while in the evening "Polishing the details of the Play" will conclude the course.

Mr. Meiklejohn has been active in the development of drama in Canada for the past twenty years. He has appeared as an actor in numerous roles and is a producer and director of note. In his present capacity as drama adviser he has travelled to every province of Canada conducting courses for members of provincial drama groups.

It is believed that the instruction will be most helpful to actors, directors, and stage-hands contemplating putting on a play this season. There is no charge for the course. All one needs to do is to send him or her name to the P. E. I. Libraries at once so the play may be admitted to all sessions.

The president then introduced the speaker of the evening, Rev. Sister Mary Eugene who told her audience about some of the problems of social welfare work, and described the various phases of the work such as relief, child supervision, adoptive service, restoration of broken homes, home nursing and home management.

She expressed the hope that sometime the Welfare Bureau would have staff and funds enough to carry on a program that would prevent many of these recurring social problems.

Discussion followed Sister Mary Eugene's very informative address and many questions were answered by the Rev. Sister.
