WINNIPEG, (CP)—The Fed-
eral Government has ordered an
immediate investigation of
charge by The Pas Chamber of
Commerce that the Lynn Lake
rail project in northern Manitoba
is being built under conditions
bordering on slave labor.

CHAMBER THURSDAY said the
story—denied in its entirety by
Canadian National Railways and
its contractors—was brought into
the Manitoba community by a
group of immigrant workers who
said they were fleeing from hard-
ship.

When the report reached Ot-
tawa, the Federal government an-
nounced an investigator was being
sent to look into the charges.

Some 600 men are working on
the project, a 144-mile CNR ex-
tension being carried out by the
R. F. Welch Ltd. construction firm
from Sherbrooke to a new mining
camp at Lynn Lake. Construction
is expected to be completed this
fall.

Says Hospital Accommodation Now Adequate

ST. CATHARINES, Ont. (CP)—
Health Minister Martin said Thurs-
day that through an "impressive
increase in hospital building, Cana-
da's country-wide deficit in hospi-
tal accommodation now is "largely
overcome."

However, federal grants for hospi-
tal construction will continue for
a second five-year period to as-
sist the provinces in filling gaps
in their hospital facilities and in
meeting the needs of Canada's
rapidly-growing population, Mr.
Martin said.

Mr. Martin's speech was pre-
pared for delivery at the opening
of St. Catharines' Hotel Dieu hospi-
tal.

Turning from the domestic to
the foreign scene, Mr. Martin said
Canadians must be concerned with
how their fellow men in other
parts of the world are faring, for
"we know that no nation or hand-
ful of nations can live in prosperi-
ty or security if the great masses
of mankind are hungry and afraid."

Only One Tuna Landed As Tournament Opens

WEDGEPORT, N. S. (CP)—Argen-
tina took the lead in the 10th
International Tuna Tournament
that began here Thursday by
landing a playful 158-pounder,
the day's only catch that team
captain Pablo Bardin reeled up
in 16 minutes. There were no
other strikes.

The baby tuna snatched Bar-
din's herring-baited hook an hour
and 38 minutes after a rusty and
pitted shotgun boomed over the
bright waters of Soldiers Rip.
The signal for anglers of 10 teams
from 13 countries to begin fish-
ing.

The catch gave Argentina 555
points. The scoring system is on
a pound basis, with 200 points
for the biggest and most fish
of the day.

The bluefin battled well for its
size but Bardin, a veteran angler,
wasted little time. The tuna, its shim-
mering length dark blue on the
back, light on the belly with
yellow tinged fins, was soon
thumping its life out on the
boat's floorboards.

With the cry of strike and the
yellow signal flag hoisted under
the Argentinian flag, the other
19 boats on the Rip, world's best
angling spot for giant tuna, scat-
tered to give Bardin plenty of
water to land his fish.

The air tingled with excite-
ment. This was only the second
fish to be caught on the Rip
since an Atlantic hurricane whip-
pied up the Atlantic seaboard
Monday, filling the Rip's clear
waters with sand and silt, and it
gave promise that the great fish
had really come back.
