Sir,—As the controversy between the two leading patrons of the Hazelbrook and Vernon River Bridge factories has ceased, and believing that it has been beneficial and instructive to the dairymen of P. E. Island, we were very glad to see, the Bedeque correspondent of the Guardian of April 5th assert that "Mr. Jno. Craig, of Middleton, supplied 1700 lbs. of milk to the Dunk River factory in one week." For this time of the year this is certainly good work, and Mr. Craig is deserving of some praise, as producing milk this time of year in large quantities is quite a different matter and requires more brains and different management than in the summer season.

No that correspondent would have been all right had he stopped when he made the statement. But when he coolly asks, "Who can beat this?" we hasten to enlighten him. The Hillsboro factory claims the honor of having the largest winter dairy patron on P. E. Island, if not in the Maritime Provinces, in the person of Mr. Edward Kelly, Southport, who delivered at the factory between April 2nd and 7th, 3,300 lbs. of milk, and who delivered from November 10, 1899, until March 31, 1900, 55,719 pounds of milk in the following proportions:
