Secret Transfer

prisonment after being held re-
sponsible for the deaths of 18
Canadian prisoners-of-war in Ger-
many in June, 1944.
A former bodyguard of Hitler,
he was found innocent of order-
ing the shooting of the Cana-
dians but guilty of responsibility
in their deaths because the shoot-
ings were done by men of his
12th S.S. Division.

Meyer, even in prison, was an
erect, meticulous figure.
A Canadian Press reporter who
visited Dorchester Penitentiary
in 1948 and saw Meyer at work
reported his military bearing
"much in evidence" and prison
officials termed him well-behaved.
The reporter, not allowed to
talk to Meyer under prison regu-
lations, said Meyer also observed
the rules and didn't even glance
away from his work in the pris-
on library.

He was put in the library when
he first entered prison and as far
as is known he never changed
jobs. About 15 other convicts—all
described as of "superior intelli-
gence"—worked with him.

Warden Goad at that time said:
"His discipline is good because he
knows the meaning of discipline.
If I told him to scrub the floor
he would do it without question."

He received no special favors
or punishment. He lived, ate, ex-
ercised and worked under the
same conditions as the 546 other
prisoners there at the time.

Ottawa in an official 150-word
statement said the transfer will
not change Meyer's life sentence
—reduced to that from death in
January, 1946.

Meyer has been reported de-
pendent and morose and threat-
ening to commit suicide over the
long separation—he was in the
penitentiary 5 1/2 years—from his
wife and five children in Ger-
many. A group in the Maritimes
has been trying for some time to
get him released or transferred.

people don't like the exertion of
change."
Mr. MacIsaac referred to the
pioneer leadership given in Nova
Scotia by Father Ronald L. Mac-
Donald, Dr. Coady, and others who
persuaded the governors of St.
Francis Xavier to organize their
extension department.

"It took great courage in the
first place for that great Islander,
Bishop James Morrison, as head of
St. F.X., to give the go-ahead sign
for the promoting of new ideas,"
he continued. It not only took
courage to cultivate this new idea
but it also took money."

The credit union movement, he
emphasized, is not just "an ugly,
common, materialistic thing. It
may be that, but it is more than
that. To me, the credit union is a
torch that signals a great message
of Christian civilization to the
down-trodden masses of the world's
people."

Vote of Thanks

A vote of thanks to Mr. Mac-
Isaac was moved by Dr. J.H.
Blanchard, who said that in the
early 1860's, the smallest incor-
porated bank in Canada was found-
ed in Rustico by the Rev. George
A. Belcourt (Parish Priest from
1859-69) with a capital of \$20,000
Named the Farmer's Bank of Rus-
tico, it was formed under a Pro-
vincial Act in Charlottetown, and
later received a charter from the
Dominion Government. The bank
ceased operations in the early
1890's. Dr. Blanchard also made
reference to speeches in 1866 by
Edward Hackett, M.P. for Prince
County, in support of the credit
union movement.

The vote of thanks was seconded
by Mr. Louis O'Connor who
urged all credit union members to
give their utmost support to the
movement, regardless of how small
their contribution may be.

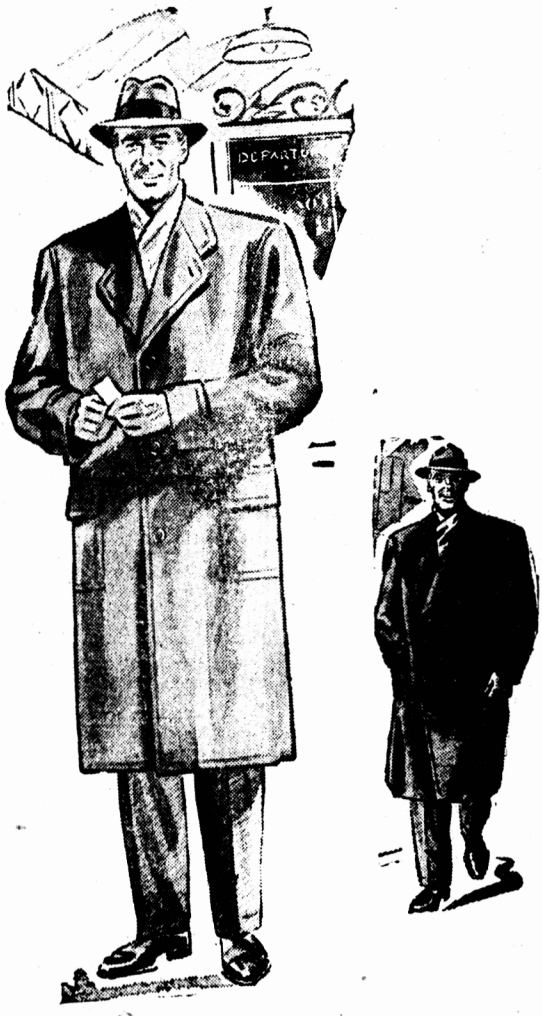
