

IN MEMORIAM

THE LATE BLYTHE HURST SR.

Mr. Blythe Hurst was born at Charlottetown, Co. Durham, Eng., on March 5th, 1861. His mother, dying when he was very young, was raised and educated by his grandparents, the Rev. Blythe Hurst, Ph. D., vicar of St. Thomas Church, Colliery County, Durham, Eng. and his wife. When a young man he married Miss Marion Fawcett of Ann Field Plains, Co. Durham, and went to reside in Newcastle-on-Tyne, where for 25 years he taught in Smart's College. Resigning from there to join a party of settlers going to Prince Edward Island, sixty people including Blythe Hurst, wife and three children arrived at Charlottetown on the S.S. Northumberland on Friday evening, May 13th, 1910.

Locating in Harrington, he taught Harrington and Winsloe schools, then became school teacher for ten years in the Protestant Orphanage. Leaving there in 1925, he became agricultural editor of The Guardian for two years, when he went to live with his son, Blythe at Brackley Beach, where he passed away on March 8th, last. For many years, under the nom de plume of "Agricola", he contributed "Newsy Notes" to the Guardian. He is survived by his widow, one daughter, May, his son Blythe, together with 13 grandchildren, who all miss him very much. One daughter, Marion, died in 1930.

At the funeral, Rev. Mr. Wilson officiated with Mrs. George Shaw as organist, the hymns including his favourite "Rock of Ages." The pallbearers were Messrs. Richard Hurst, George Hughes, Elve Robinson, Charles Gregor, Robert Roberts and Milford Cudmore.
