## Eldon Man Fatally Injured In Level Crossing Accident

## 100 Pilots Quit Jobs At Suez

CAIRO (CP)—About 100 foreign pilots on the Suez Canal gave notice Wednesday that they will quit Friday night. Their withdrawal will cripple and possibly paralyze the vital 100-mile waterway.

There were 205 canal pilots registered when the waterway was nationalized. The various nations contributed these numbers: France 61, Britain 54, The Netherlands 14, Denmark four, Sweden two, United States two, Egypt 40, Greece 11, Norway 10, Italy two, Yugoslavia one, Belgium two, Spain one, and Poland one.

## U. S. Potato Production Estimates Show Increase

"The United States Department of Agriculture September 11 estimate of U. S. potato production, shows an over-all increase from the August estimate of 2,400,000 cwt. This is 6,630,000 cwt. higher than final 1955 production figures."

"The Maine Potato Growers are meeting with Washington officials today with the intention of working out a diversion program to go into effect immediately. Many other States are expected to look for a similar program, and at the present time they are considering a payment of 75 cents per cwt. for these diverted stocks. Last year's payment was at the rate of 50 cents per cwt. until December 31st with lower payments after that date. Their idea is to offer a larger payment in the early part of the season in order to attract more potatoes to the diversion outlets and thereby better stabilize the market for the balance of the season. Reports yesterday indicate that no serious frost damage has yet been encountered in either Maine or New Brunswick, and it is estimated that if no serious frosts occur for another week, Maine will have the largest crop ever produced.

Canadian production is estimated at 60.9 million bushels (36.54 million cwt.). This is 4 per cent lower than last year, made up of a 2 per cent reduction in acreage and an estimated 2 per cent lower yield. "Locally some fields suffered frost damage Sunday night and the general feeling seems to be that our crop will not be as heavy as last year. New Brunswick sources suggest a minor reduction in their total crop."

## Oil Fire Danger In Toronto Harbor
