Other buyers included Frank Bryan, Robert Campbell and A. Thomas Chappell.

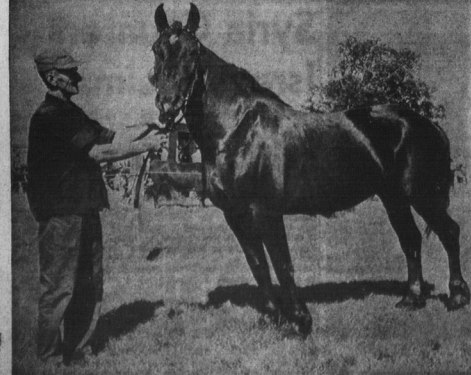
3 Students Get Prizes

These prizes are presented annually by the women's Institute of the Alberton convention area.

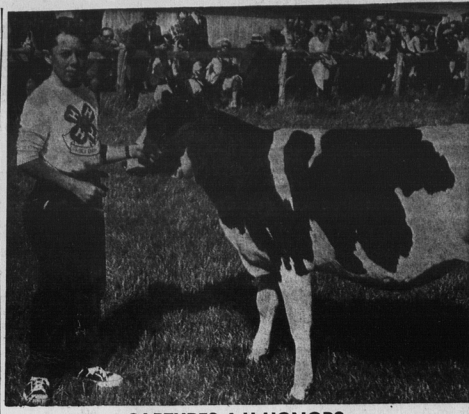
This year's awards were merited by John McNeill of Alberton, Irving of Union and Doris Dalton of Roseville.

Illegal Nets By Russians Are Reported

BOSTON (AP)—The president of the Atlantic Fishermen's Union reported Wednesday what he described as the first solid evidence that Russian fishermen off New England are using nets ruled illegal under the International Convention for the Northwest Atlantic Fisheries.

The president, Capt. James Ackert, said he is filing protests with the convention in Halifax and with the U.S. state department.

He displayed what he said was fishing gear made in the Soviet Union, brought to the Boston fish pier by the American crew of a Massachusetts vessel which found it in the Georges Bank fishing grounds, off Newfoundland. He said it consists of netting of less than half-inch mesh used as an inner liner in an approximate four-inch mesh net.

"Even a sardine couldn't get through this mesh," Capt. Ackert said.

Hunger Strike Launched By Freedmites

AGASSIZ, B.C. (CP)—Sons of Freedom Doukhobors are fasting on both sides of the fence at Mountain Prison five and a half miles from Vancouver. Inside, a number of the 116 inmates were being force-fed Wednesday while several of the gates, on the outside, near the hundred adults started a hunger strike in sympathy.

Some of the more than 500 sect members outside may get a chance to sit on the other side of a jail fence if the RCMP enforces a municipal bylaw forbidding tent camps of more than five persons an acre.

Police said they would start to serve summonses to a number of the Freedmites squatting outside the gates in a tent town constructed soon after they arrived here by bus from Vancouver Tuesday.

PRISONERS FED
Prisoners who haven't eaten for a month were ordered fed Sunday by Warden Tom Hall and Allan J. McLeod, commissioner of penitentiaries.

McLeod said those who would not pick up a glass of egg nog and drink voluntarily had nourishment forced into them by tubes to their stomachs.
