Along with Crowley and Hall from Boston will come Andrew Gonzalez and Tony Veronis. Gonzalez goes against Don "Duck" Trainor of Charlotteville in a ten round co-feature.

Veronis meets Roy "Tiger" Steele formerly of Charlotteville and now fighting out of New Glasgow under the guidance of Henry Flinsinger who is tutoring Steele for a title shot at Percy Paris.

The Boston fighter Veronis has had 20 straight professional victories and is a regular ten round feature fighter. He and Steele will mix in a six rounder.

Doctors Prepare Retirement Plan

ST. ANDREWS, N.B. (CP)—A retirement saving plan for doctors was outlined to the New Brunswick Medical Society Tuesday by Dr. A. D. Kelly of Toronto, general secretary of the Canadian Medical Association.

He said doctors are the first large group to take advantage of federal legislation last spring giving self-employed persons the same income tax privileges as other taxpayers who contribute to pension funds.

Dr. Kelly said the plan is expected to be approved by the national revenue department within two days and to be launched in mid-September. It will be known as the Canadian Medical Retirement Savings Plan.

Each participant in a year decides how much he will contribute for his annuity and deposits will be made at any Bank of Montreal branch. A doctor will have the right to change the amounts he deposits annually.

Hickory Smoke Wins Big Race

DU QUOIN, Ill. (AP)—Hickory Smoke, the winter book favorite, beat Hoot Song by half a length Tuesday to win the \$111,126 Hambletonian.

The bay colt, which Johnny Simpson drove to three consecutive heat victories, had the lead for the first turn and held on to fight off a stretch bid by Hoot Song. Hickory Smoke posted a time of 2:08 4-5, slowest on record for the Hambletonian.

Simpson, 37, of Maitland, Fla., this year had finished no better than second twice in eight starts. Hickory Smoke won the fifth highest money in the trotting classic's 32-year history—\$49,917.62. Its owners, L. V. Sheppard and A. C. Mudge of Hanover, Pa., bought the colt last year for \$15,000 from Bowman Brown, of Harrisburg, Pa., a racing magazine editor.

Hoot Song and Hickory Smoke earlier had won two heats in the two-division running. It was the first two-heat runoff in Hambletonian annals.

Hoot Song, a home-bred black filly owned by Two Gait Farm, Carmel, Ind., was driven by Ralph Baldwin, 47, of Longwood, Fla. It stayed just behind Hickory Smoke all the way.

Joe O'Brien, the veteran driver from Alberton, P.E.I., drove Bond Hanover in the first division and finished fifth in each heat. Bond Hanover, owned by S. A. Camp Farms, placed out of the money.

In the second division, O'Brien drove Mudge Hanover, also owned by S. A. Camp Farms, to fourth place in the first heat and seventh in the second. Mudge Hanover's share of the purse was \$1,069.04.

Hoot Song, sired by Hoot Mon, whose two-minute mile record in 1947 was nearly matched in the divisional heats, made her bid half way around the far turn.

As an overflowing grandstand crowd of 25,000 roared, Hoot Song nearly drew abreast, but Smoke again opened a length margin by the head of the stretch and maintained it without a flick of the whip by Simpson.

Smoke, the two-year-old trotting champion of 1956 with 11 firsts in 34 starts, made the Kentucky Derby of harness racing his fourth victory in 11 outings this season.

Cards Split As Dodgers Lose And Braves Win

PITTSBURGH (AP)—St. Louis Cardinals dropped 7 1/2 games back of first-place Milwaukee Tuesday night, losing a 2-1 decision to Pittsburgh Pirates after winning a suspended game of July 21 by a 11-2 margin.

The only consolation for the Cards was that veteran Stan Musial was able to make a token appearance and establish a National League record of having played 893 consecutive games.

Bob Friend, the Pirate fire-balling righthander, outpitched young Don Daniel to win the regulation contest. Friend, now with a 10-6 record, gave up only five hits, McDaniel, losing his fourth game in 11 decisions, allowed eight hits.

Musial went into the lineup of the suspended game as a pinch runner. The old National League record of having played in the most consecutive games was set by first baseman Gus Suhr of the Pirates. He played in 822 games from Sept. 11, 1931 to June 4, 1937. The major league mark of 2,130 consecutive games was set by the late Lou Gehrig of New York Yankees.
