

**An English Trade Expedition to Africa.**

Advices have been received in Liverpool from Mr. Donald Mackenzie, announcing his arrival, all well, at Lanzarote, Canary Island, on the 25th ult. in the "Corsair," the steamer in which he sailed from Bristol recently. He hoped to reach Cape Juby on the following day, and to begin at once the formation of a permanent trading station there. The Bani fishermen brought word that a large number of Moors and other natives had come down from the interior, and were waiting to receive Mr. Mackenzie and to trade with him, and he was in strong hopes of a successful result of his negotiations. His party intended to take inside the harbour at Cape Juby a large brig, the "Amazonia," which had been towed out for the purpose, and to anchor it there to be used as a house for their accommodation during their stay on the coast.

**THE POTATO BUG IN NEW BRUNSWICK.**—Our venerable contemporary, the St. Andrews "Standard," says:—"The potato bug's march is telling now. They are appearing in hosts, and require constant attacks from men, women and children where there are large patches. Every hour thousands are burned, and persons return to the fields to find them nearly as numerous as before. As yet they have not been very destructive, but it is feared that next year they will be in our midst in myriads.

Mr. Connolly, who has for so long been writing up the manufactures of this continent for the London "Times," is about to visit Cornwall with a view to acquiring information regarding the cotton, woollen and other industries located in that town. He will afterwards go to Manitoba and make himself thoroughly acquainted with the capabilities of the Northwest as a grain-producing country.

Winnipeg journals advocate the establishment of pioneer colonies in the Peace river district. Dunvegan is suggested as a suitable location for the first colony. Professor Macoun speaks of the land as being of extraordinary fertility, the climate is mild, there is an absence of muskegs, plenty of fish and game, and wood within easy distance, and a navigable river. The mining district of Omineca, in British Columbia, is only one hundred and fifty miles distant and easily accessible, affording another market for produce at good prices. The agricultural capabilities of the Peace river district are not excelled by any other section in the Northwest.

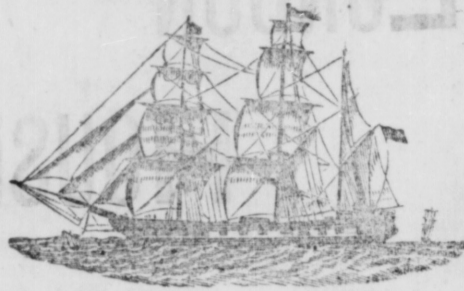

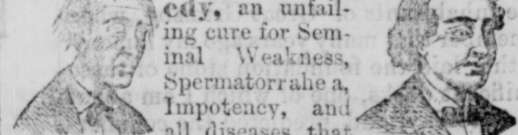
