Summerside Physician Passes Away In Hospital

Dr. A. Roy Grant, 63, a highly respected and well known Summerside physician, passed away in Prince County Hospital here yesterday morning following an illness of two years.

Born on September 9, 1903, in Charlottetown, he was the son of Dr. T. V. Grant and Minnie Donovan Grant of Charlottetown, and was a member of a family that devoted many years to medicine.

Following his early education in Montague, where his father practiced medicine, Dr. Grant attended St. Dunstan's University, from which institution he graduated with a B.A. in 1925. During the next five years, he taught school in Rollo Bay and Alberton.

In 1931, he received his B.Sc. from St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, N.S., and in 1937, he graduated from Dalhousie Medical School, Halifax, N.S.

His Summerside practice, extending over 27 years, began in 1937. After post-graduate studies in Chicago and New York, Dr. Grant was certified in general surgery with the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada in 1947. That same year, he became a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons. During his post-graduate studies, he continued his practice in Summerside.

Dr. Grant was a founding member of the Summerside HELPED FOUND CENTER.

Games Officials Hold Meeting

Tignish Resident Is Assessed \$75

ALBERTON — A Tignish fisherman, Francis Joseph Gaudet was fined \$75 and costs by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald at Alberton yesterday for having on board his boat five lobster traps not bearing tags issued to him by the Department of Fisheries. While disallowing a request for confiscation of Gaudet's boat on the first case to come before him under the new trap restrictions, the Magistrate issued a stern warning that, in future, anyone caught with any other than their own traps would automatically have their boat confiscated in addition to a fine. Gaudet was represented by Bruce MacDonald.

Elton Aubrey Wedge, St. Edwards, was fined \$25 and costs for possession of sixteen undersized lobsters.

Edgar Roy Johnson, Alberton, was fined \$100 and costs for permitting a vehicle to be operated on the highway using marked gasoline.

Norman Stanley MacDougall, O'Leary, represented by Bruce MacDonald, charged originally with racing with another vehicle was found guilty of speeding and fined \$60 and costs.

John Emmet Carragher, Ebbesfleet, was fined \$50 and costs for theft not exceeding \$50.

Charged with unlawfully obtaining goods by issuing a worthless cheque Lawrence Stephen Butler, O'Leary was fined \$50 and costs.

\$25 FINES

Reginald Francis Gallant and Everett Basil Gallant of Coleman were each fined \$25 and costs for causing a disturbance in a public place by fighting.

Under the highway traffic act fines of \$10 and costs were handed out to Lloyd Emerson Gard, Fortune Cove, exceeding the speed limit in a thirty mile zone; John Robert Milligan, Inverness, and John James Nelligan, Tignish, operating improperly equipped vehicles; Sydney Green Rennie, Elmsdale, backing a vehicle where it was unsafe to do so; Leonard Francis Richard, Tignish, driving without a license; Ronald Fenton Boylan, West Devon, driving

without due care and attention; Harvey Jeffrey, Coleman, tire squealing.

Twelve persons were fined \$20 and costs for unlawful possession of liquor.

It was announced yesterday by Moncrieff Williamson, the Confederation Centre Art Gallery director, that a special award of \$6,000 has been awarded to the Confederation gallery to develop a Robert Harris Retrospective Exhibition which will tour Canada in 1967.

Harris, a Welshman who emigrated to Prince Edward Island in 1854, was a founder of the Royal Canadian Academy, the leading portraitist of his day, and the painter of Canada's most famous historical painting, "The Fathers of Confederation."

Confederation Centre Gallery holds the permanent collection of Harris' work, but several of his paintings are in possession of the National Gallery in Ottawa. Many others hang in public buildings and in private collections across the country. The retrospective collection will gather the best of these for exhibition during centennial year.

In making the grant, Georges Gauthier, Associate Centennial Commissioner, said: "The Commission wishes to offer its most sincere best wishes for the success of your project, and its congratulations in developing a

most imaginative Centennial Programme in the Visual Arts."

The Commission grant will be used to arrange for the collection of paintings from a number of centres across the country and for the preparation of a suitable catalogue. Some restorative work must also be undertaken on a number of paintings.

The exhibition will be on view at Confederation Centre Gallery during July and August 1967 as a feature of the Charlottetown Summer Festival and will then go on tour to major Canadian galleries.

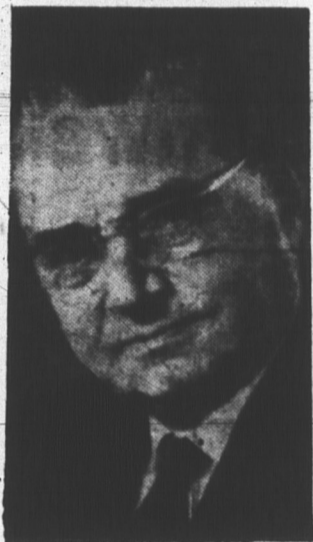
