Here are some scholarships you might be interested in:

P.E.I. Public Service Association Inc. Bursaries
Applications are now available for the \$500 bursaries awarded by the P.E.I. Public Service Association to its members or dependents of members or former or deceased members who will be enrolled as full-time students at a post-secondary institution during the next semester. The decision will be based on three factors 1) financial need 2) academic ability and 3) involvement in PSA activities of applicant of member of which applicant is a dependent.
Deadline: Nov. 30, 1981

The Canadian Federation of University Women;
Margaret Dale Philip Award

This award is open to any woman who holds a bachelor's degree or equivalent from a recognized Canadian university who resides in Canada, and who wishes to enter a programme leading to an advanced degree in the field of humanities or social sciences.

Deadline: Dec. 15, 1981

Awarded to Business Administration students who plan to acquire an MBA or MSc. English language winners will be required to attend a Canadian French language university. French award winners will be required to attend a Canadian English language university. \$10,000 paid over a period of two years, plus summer employment.
