### WARSHIPS COMING.

They are Expected Here Early To-morrow Afternoon.

It is expected that the new flagship Crescent, the cruisers Proserpine and Indefatigable, and the torpedo boat-destroyer Quail, will arrive in Charlottetown early tomorrow afternoon, and remain until Tuesday, when they will proceed to Sydney. The Crescent is a cruiser of the first-class and is 7,700 tons. Her officers are: Vice-Admiral—Sir Frederick G. D. Bedford, K. C. B.

The Proserpine is a first class cruiser 2,135 tons. This is the Proserpine's first time on the North American station. Her officers are,—

The Indefatigable is a second class cruiser, 3,600 tons. Her officers according to the latest available Navy List, are as follows:—

The Quail is the first warship of her type ever on this station, and will, no doubt, attract much attention. She was built at Birkenhead and launched in 1895. Her dimensions are as follows: Length 213 feet 6 inches; beam 21 feet 6 inches, mean draught with full load, 8 feet 6 inches, and displaces 300 tons. She has twin screws. The two engines develop 6,000 indicated horse power, giving her a speed of 30.38 knots on her trial trip, and although not the fastest, yet is one of the fastest vessels of her type in the British navy, or any other navy. Her armament consists of one 3 inch 12 pound quick firer, five six pound quick firers, and two torpedo tubes. Some of the 27 knot boats carried three tubes, the additional one being placed in the bows, but that was done away with in the 30 knot destroyers, as a vessel going at that rate of speed would likely overrun the torpedo, as the torpedo's rate of speed at the utmost is about 30 knots. Her coal capacity is 90 tons, and her complement for a foreign station, 62 officers and men. Steam is supplied to the engines from four water-tube boilers, two forward of the engines, and two aft of the engines, the engines being between the two sets.
