

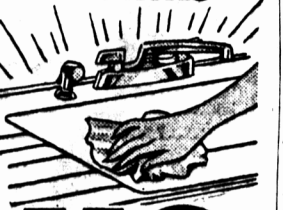
ATTENTION Montague curiers. Important meeting at club-room on Thursday, Oct. 21 at 8:00 p.m. Large attendance requested.

BON AMI CLEANSER

Killed in Crash of R.C.A.F. Sabre

OTTAWA, (CP)—FO. R.J. Christoffersen, 26, a native of Denmark was killed Wednesday when his RCAF Sabre crashed near Strasbourg, France.

Air force headquarters said the cause of the crash is not yet known. The plane was based at Bad Soellingen, Germany, as part of Canada's air division in Europe. Christoffersen came to Canada after the Second World War and served for a time in the Canadian army before joining the air force. He married a Chatham, N. B. girl last February just before his posting overseas. His father lives in Copenhagen.

More than 20 Sabre jet fighters were grounded last week at the Canadian air base at Gros Tenuin, France, following two accidents in which no one was killed.

An air force spokesman at Gros Tenuin said the accidents resulted from "flame outs"—the technical term for an engine quitting.

Headquarters here declined further comment pending information from the air division's headquarters.

Earlier this week, the Montreal Star said in a dispatch from Gros Tenuin that the fuel on the base had been found contaminated with grit and water.

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Souris Credit Union In Annual Meeting

Rifle Hunting Case Dismissed
Yesterday afternoon in the magistrate's court in Georgetown a person from Georgetown Royalty charged under the Game Act with hunting game with a loaded rifle had his case dismissed. The decision is unprecedented in P. E. I. court history and is causing great speculation among Kings County residents. The defendant's defence was that he was hunting foxes.

Six other cases were heard during the afternoon. A party from St. Peter's, charged with operating a vehicle without a license, was fined \$5 or five days. A person from Murray River charged with speeding was fined \$10 or ten days.

A party from Montague charged under the Temperance Act with being intoxicated was fined \$20 or thirty days. A person from Montague charged with driving while impaired had the evidence heard and the case adjourned for one week. A party from Murray Har-

bor charged with passing another car on a hill was fined \$10 or ten days in jail. A party from Abney was charged with driving without a license and fined \$5 or five days in jail.
