



Corinth in the days of the Roman empire was a cosmopolitan port and commercial center. The apostle Paul established a church there in 50 A.D., but a few years later he heard reports of great corruption within—1 Corinthians 1:11.



Paul wrote a letter to the Christians in Corinth, rebuking them and urging them to do better. His first complaint was their lack of harmony; they split into groups favoring various leaders, forgetting that all glory was God's—1 Corinthians 2:5-9.



He reminded them that no job was better than any other, for it is only God who gives growth. It is the way in which each does his work that counts; only the solidly built will survive, and the sloppy builder will be punished—1 Corinthians 3:5-17.



He also reminded them that the wisdom of God appeared to be foolishness to most men, who lacked the Spirit of God which made them understand things spiritual—1 Corinthians 2:6, 8-13.

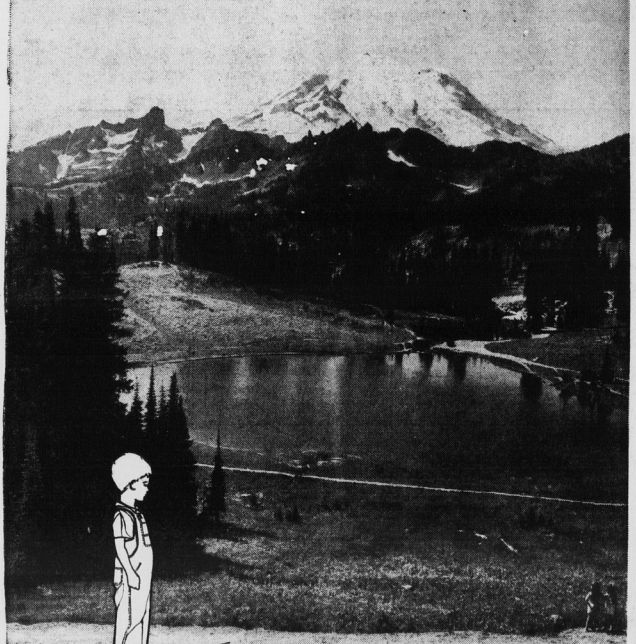

pressed desire of Christ. Bearing in mind his closing declaration to the Apostles—"All power is given me in Heaven and upon earth"—we can see the power of Christ moving behind the efforts of mankind to achieve unity. Christ supports mankind and at the same time respects mankind's freedom. He presents a picture to mankind of the fruit of unity. Personally is never lost or suppressed.
