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Snow Plows Busy After Storm Blocks Highways

Highway traffic throughout King's County was halted yesterday as a result of a snow storm which began late Monday night and continued until late yesterday afternoon. By mid morning snow had piled in two and three foot drifts, and had partly filled road cuttings where highways were not built up. Only short stretches of the main highway were relatively clear where the high wind blew the snow off the built up section.

In Montague early morning traffic was unable to move until the snow plow cleared the main street about mid-morning, but the street rapidly filled in again, so that further travel was hazardous. Cars were lined up at the bottom of the Post Office Hill and MacDonald's Hill and only after considerable work was the traffic congestion cleared. Last evening cars began to move out to the main highway, but were proceeding cautiously.

Snowplows are busily clearing highways throughout King's County this morning so as to get traffic flowing again at the normal rate following yesterday's paralyzing snow storm. The plow from Lower Montague is clearing the Lower Montague, Montague and Sturgeon areas, the Montague plow is clearing the north side of Montague, the main highway to Vernon River, Georgetown and Cardigan, the Lorne Valley and surrounding areas. The Murray River plow is clearing the Commercial Road, and Murray River and Murray Harbour districts and the Annandale plow is clearing to Cardigan, then Fort St. John, and Mitchell River and the main pavement going to Souris. Plows in the north section of the county are also at work clearing the main highway to Souris and East Point, and other main roads. It is expected that in about two to three days all traffic lanes will be cleared for normal traffic.

OTTAWA, Jan. 12 (Special)—Sole representative of Prince Edward Island at the contingent to Parliament at his desk when the House of Commons reconvened today was T. J. Kiekham, Liberal member for King's.

Ahead of his colleagues, Mr. Kiekham caught the "Scotian" at St. John's, made the connection at Montreal and reached Ottawa shortly after noon today. J. Watson MacNaught, parliamentary assistant to Fisheries Minister Sinclair, and Liberal member for Prince J. Angus MacLean, Conservative member for Queen's and Neil A. Matheson, Liberal member for Queen's are arriving in Ottawa this evening.

Since the Senate has a week longer holiday recess than the House of Commons, Island Senators are not expected here until early next week.

If Korean War Renewed Air Force Must Be Ready

SEOUL (Reuters)—Lt.-Gen. Samuel E. Anderson, commander of the United States 9th Air Force in Korea, said today that if war breaks out in Korea again, "the breaks out in Korea would be all-important to the air force."

"We must be ready instantly if the enemy strikes again," he said, adding that the 5th Air Force has been flying an average of 500 training flights a day since the Korean cease-fire came into effect last July 27.

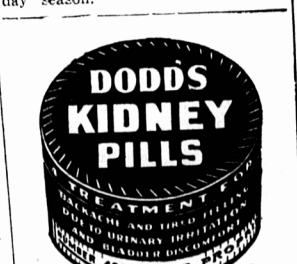

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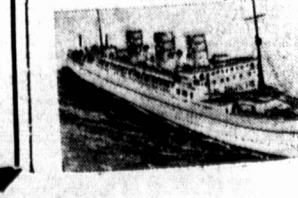
