

# Communists Report British-owned Ships Arrive One Per Day At Shanghai Harbor

SHANGHAI (Reuters) — British ships are steaming into Shanghai harbor at the rate of one a day along with fleets of others European vessels, Communist Chinese authorities said Sunday.

A total of 246 foreign vessels arrived in the huge port during the first half of 1954 with a British armada of 182 ships making up the bulk of the arrivals, deputy director E. C. Chen of the Communist East China Foreign Trade Bureau told British reporters here.

In addition to the British ships, which make up 69 percent of the incoming shipping, Russian, French, Polish, Swedish, Dutch, Norwegian, Danish, Czechoslovakian and Japanese vessels have arrived, harbor director A. P. Yang said.

The figures included coastal ships from Hong Kong.

General foreign trade in Shanghai is increasing yearly, Chen said. Using an index figure of 100 for 1951, the value of imports and exports rose to 147 in 1953, he stated.

He said, however, that Shanghai's import trade for "capitalist countries" as opposed to Communist "new democracies" fell to index figure 57 in 1953, compared to 100 in 1951.

Imports from Russia did not arrive in Shanghai and therefore were not included in the figure, Chen said.

Export trade with "capitalist countries" meanwhile, rose to index figure 164 in 1953, he said.

Chen said the percentage of Shanghai's trade with Britain was not big in proportion to total trade with "capitalist countries" despite the predominance of British ships. He said Britain accounted for only six per cent of the imports in 1951, 12 per cent in 1952, 13 per cent in 1953 and 15 per cent during the first half of this year.

In exports, Britain's percentage ranged from 4.8 in 1951 to 15.89 at present, he said. The figures did not include Hong Kong trade.

### DUCKED QUESTION

Chen ducked a question whether any of the ships' cargoes violated the strategic goods embargo imposed on Communist China by the United Nations. "We only buy articles as we can and do not consider whether they are under embargo," he said.

The Communist officials made their statements to British reporters accompanying eight Labor members of Parliament now touring Communist China under the leadership of party chief Clement Attlee.

Chen said the embargo "cannot sever economic relations between China and foreign countries," and he claimed it is not having the ef-

## Duke of Argyll Busy Salvaging Spanish Treasure

TOBERMORY, Scotland (AP)—The 51-year-old Duke of Argyll pumped mud at a furious rate Thursday as much fun as a kid digging for treasure.

And treasure was that the duke was after, out on the rippling surface of misty Tobermory bay.

On a little ship of the type the Scots call a puffer, the duke was managing the machinery clearing four centuries of silt from the old galleon of the Spanish armada, the Duc de Florencia.

Wrecked in the ill-fated Spanish attempt to conquer Britain, the galleon lies in 12 fathoms of water. There is a thrilling story that it is full of gold, and maybe holds a king's crown.

The galleon and what's in it belongs to the duke, except one-hundredth part which belongs to the Queen. It is the duke's by virtue of a "deed of gift" made to his forebears by King Charles I in 1642.

Every couple of years the duke has a go at salvaging the galleon. Thus far he has recovered some cups and saucers, two bronze cannons, some chunks of timber a few coils and empty beer bottles. The beer bottles apparently were tossed overboard from excursion steamers by late-day Scots.

On the duke's team are war-trained "frogmen" equipped with underwater cameras.
