VANCOUVER (CP)—Dean Geoffrey Andrew of the University of British Columbia says the proposal of Sons of Freedom Doukhobors to move to Russia may be just publicity stunt.

Dean Andrew, deputy to the university president, was chairman of the Doukhobor consultative committee which studied the problem of the religious sect for the provincial government.

"There have been dozens of rumors of a move by the Sons of Freedom over the years and many

explorations by them in new lands," he said in an interview, "But nothing has ever come of it all."

"No country will take them until they accept the responsibility for having their children educated for such peaceful purposes within their religious beliefs as any other citizens."
