Two Types Of Item Planned For Concert

"We're concentrating heavily on two types of item - Canadian music in general, French Canadian - specifically, with some rather odd contrasts."

That's the coming program for the August 7 Sunday Concert at the Charlottetown Festival, as described by Atlantic Orchestra Conductor John Fenwick.

The orchestra will play Andre Prevost's "Celebration", Satie's "Gymnopedies", Mozart's "Symphony No. 129 in a major", Francois Morla's "Esquisse pour orchestra", and Morris Surdin's "Dances from The Remarkable Rocket".

"I consider it a very odd program, but I think in its oddness it will have appeal," says Fenwick. "Certainly in its oddness it has variety - tremendous variety."

Prevost's work "Celebration" was specially commissioned for the Festival, and "evokes the bright and brilliant atmosphere of a happy anniversary," mixed with nostalgia and a little sadness. In the work the piano is used only as a percussion instrument. Brass and percussion instruments dominate in the beginning and end; with middle section played by strings and woodwinds.

New Addition Arrives In Port

GEORGETOWN - The latest edition to the Eastern Fisheries Dragger Fleet is the East Pack 1 which arrived here in port yesterday. This steel dragger was built by Ferguson Industries Limited of Pictou, N.S. The East Pack 1 is captained by George Hickey and has a crew of eight.

The first trip that this new dragger will make will be to St. Paul's Fishing Grounds of the coast of Cape Breton.

Three more similar trawlers will be arriving in port within the next few months. Two of these trawlers will be at U.S.E.N. Fisheries while the other will be with Eastern Fisheries. The arrival of the two new draggers will expand the Eastern Fisheries Pack from 10 to 12 draggers.

Retired Priest Buried Today

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—Rev. Michael Edward Fleming, 74, retired Roman Catholic priest and a onetime Canadian soldier who swapped cigarettes and beer with Germans in one of the strange no-man's-land interludes of the First World War, will be buried Monday.

He died Wednesday after a number of years of ill health. He came to Mt. Angel, Ore., in 1922 to study for the priesthood and there met Rev. Raphael-Bleumel of Mt. Angel Abbey in their reminiscing it developed that both were in a party of Canadian and German soldiers who left the trenches at Ypres and fraternized one day when dense fog halted the fighting.

He was born at Killaloe, Ont., was graduated from the University of Toronto and had been a leading figure in Catholic youth work in Oregon.

Surviving are two sisters, Mrs. Helen Fregoning of Seattle and Sister Julietta of the Gray Nuns at Pembroke, Ont.

CNR Changes Time Tables

MONTREAL (CP)—The CNR announced Friday it will introduce time-tables using the 24-hour clock system, beginning Oct. 30.

A CNR spokesman said the new measure will serve to remove the A.M. and P.M. differentiation used in existing time-tables and will conform with the 24-hour clock schedules now employed by western trainmen on runs through the Rockies.

Record Planting In Spring Wheat

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian farmers planted a record 29,928,000 acres of spring wheat this year, seven per cent more than in 1965, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics said Friday in its preliminary survey of seeded acreages.

The spring wheat acreage compared with a 1954-63 average of 23,794,000 acres. Acreage was 27,900,000 a year ago and 29,200,000 in 1964.

In the Prairie provinces where almost all spring wheat acreage lies, Saskatchewan reported a six-per-cent increase to 19,700,000 acres. Alberta was up nine per cent to 6,600,000 and Manitoba up seven per cent to 3,200,000.

The increase is part of Canada's policy of promoting regional training in underdeveloped countries, Mr. Butler told a service club here Wednesday.

Southport Site Is Being Groomed

An attractive picnic site, and place for visitors from nearby Charlottetown and area is being groomed at Southport, less than four miles from the City.

The area is comprised of the old Southport hatchery pond and the area known formerly as Kelly's rock and shale pit or quarry.

Many thousands of loads of rock and shale were hauled from the old site for many purposes. What was left was an unattractive scar on the side of the beautiful surrounding countryside.

Now workmen under the direction of Wendell Proffitt, director of provincial parks, have made an excellent job of smoothing out the rough spots, and spreading a covering of top soil over the quarry area.

Even the steep banks of the old quarry, or pit have been graded skillfully so that the entire area will blend into a most acceptable picnic area when the grass is grown on the area, and that is expected to be well underway next year.

In addition to the pond and the former quarry area, there is a bit of woods at the back which lends to the area's acceptability as a beauty and picnic spot.

Centennial Canoeists To Try Demonstration

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's centennial canoeists will paddle to Manhattan this month to toughen their sinews.

They may also give a little publicity to the centennial and Expo 67-although the centennial commission didn't mention this aspect recently as it announced details of two sets of "trials" this month.

The first will be held in British Columbia starting Saturday, from Fort St. James to Victoria. The other will begin Aug. 22 at Lachine, Que., and proceed to New York via the Expo 67 site. Each trip will cover about 1,000 miles.

Taking part will be nine paddlers—six regulars and three spares - from each of eight provinces and two territories. Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland are not participating mainly because of the costs involved and because they have few experienced canoeists.

The trials are called a preview of next year's centennial canoe pageant, a 100-day, 3,500-mile trek from Alberta to Montreal. The pageant will start at Rocky Mountain House in central Alberta and follow the old fur trade routes east to the St. Lawrence.

While the trials are mainly to publicize the centennial, they are also the final tests for the men and canoes before the centennial run.

The B.C. trials starting Saturday will go from Fort St.
