## The Markets.

THERE is nothing new in "the situation"  
—to be noted. Oats continue in limited sup-  
ply at Charlottetown at 30 cents per bushel  
for black and 32 for white. At Summerville  
—where the quality is reported superior  
—a larger quantity has changed hands at  
34 cents per bushel. For potatoes, from  
18 to 20 cents per bushel are still being  
paid. Buyers continue to fear the rot—  
and not without reason, if reports from the  
country be true.

In Chicago, oats are quoted at 27 cents,  
and in New York at 32 1/2 cents—so that our  
farmers are receiving as much (or more) for  
their grain as those of the United States.
