To Stand Trial In Supreme Court

Francis Arsenault, Summerside, yesterday was committed for trial in the Supreme Court, at the conclusion of a preliminary hearing before Magistrate E.H. Strong in Summerside police court.

The accused had been charged with indecently assaulting an 18-year-old girl. The case is alleged to have occurred when the girl, while proceeding from Charlottetown to her home in Conway for the Christmas holidays, was obliged to stop over in Summerside between trains.

It is alleged that while proceeding to the station from a nearby restaurant to which she had gone for a lunch, that she was accosted on the street by the accused, whom she had not previously known, and was forcibly dragged to an out of the way place where she was beaten about the face, and indecently assaulted.

At a previous hearing the court had taken evidence from the girl. Eight witnesses were heard yesterday including three Summerside girls who gave evidence that placed Arsenault in the area at the approximate time the offence is alleged to have been committed.

Mr. J. Harold Goodwin, crown prosecutor, represented the crown throughout the taking of evidence in the preliminary hearing. The accused, a naval rating, has been committed to stand trial at the next sitting of the Supreme Court. -S.

By Bill Boss FUSAN, Korea, Jan. 3 (CP) - An official Canadian party headed by Defence Minister Claxton and Veterans Affairs Minister Lapointe today flew from the frosty Korean battlefield to the sunshine of this port city to visit the United Nations cemetery here. Using the aircraft of Gen. Matthew Ridgway, U.N. Supreme Commander, the group was welcomed by Lt.-Col. Leith Crue of Winnipeg and Capt. Bill Mercer of Calgary. A South Korean military band played while the Canadian party was introduced to U.N. officials, headed by Sir. Arthur Rucker, head of the U.N.'s Korean Rehabilitation Agency. Claxton and Lapointe placed wreaths in the cemetery overlooking Fusan Harbor after lunch at the British Embassy where Gen. D'Aleis Alex Adams was host. (The Lt.-Col. Crue referred to is apparently Leith Crue from Summerside, P. E. I., who has been with the Canadian Army since the Second World War.)
