

REFERRING to Senator Carvell's suggestion the *Moncton Times* remarks: "It is a little surprising that the local Governments in these Maritime Provinces are not more forward in advancing the cattle trade at this important crisis, when private enterprise is doing so much in that direction. There is an annual expenditure in these Provinces of considerably over a million dollars, and yet it seems that any expenditure for the benefit of agriculturists is only made after persistent asking.

THAT Cape Colonists are protesting against the recall of Sir Bartle Frere is but natural. The policy pursued by the Governor involved the expenditure of millions of pounds of British money in their midst, and it brought them into prominence all over the world. But the people of England will pay little heed to their protests. It would be strange, indeed, if the British taxpayers should land the man who caused the loss of so many thousands of pounds sterling, and so many soldiers, without obtaining any material equivalent.

THE *Toronto Mail*, of the 9th has the following cable from London:

"The negotiations between the Canadian Ministers and the English Capitalists for the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway are progressing very satisfactorily. The announcement in certain Canadian journals that the mission had failed is entirely without foundation. To the contrary, Sir John Macdonald and his colleagues are meeting with even a larger measure of success than they anticipated, and they are confident that an agreement satisfactory alike to the Canadian people and to the gentlemen with whom they are in treaty will be arrived at before long. The London papers with one or two exceptions, have treated the subject fairly. An enormous amount of capital is now seeking investment here and prospects of favorable bargain for Canada are excellent. Many leading men on both sides of politics are helping the Canadians, and the Imperial Government is taking a lively and active, if indirect, part in the negotiations."

Canadian Salmon in England.

Mr. Frank Buckland has lately published his fourteenth annual report as an inspector of Salmon Fisheries in England and Wales. Of the Canadian salmon received in London in December, Mr. Buckland speaks very highly. "They were," he says, "as fine salmon as I ever saw, many being over thirty pounds in weight, and even if the external appearance had been insufficient to prove them to have been 'clean run,' an examination of the viscera was amply sufficient to show they were in the highest possible condition. It was thought advisable to try the experiment of sending them over to the English markets, freezing them by a patent process, and the experiment succeeded admirably. So far as I am aware, the public who bought it were perfectly satisfied as to its appearance and quality, and during this next winter, directly the British fisheries are closed, the public may expect a large supply of frozen fish from Canada. This will necessarily very much effect the price of Dutch fish, and it is possible that in course of time it may also effect the British salmon fisheries."

A Batch of Ottawa Items.

It is rumored that coal has been discovered within 14 miles of the city.

The Pacific Railway Commission will commence taking evidence on Thursday.

It is said that the Government have reconsidered their determination to sell leases of certain of the Thousand Islands.

A private despatch received here to-day from a reliable source says the negotiations for building the Pacific Railway will probably be closed before the end of the present month. It is said (but your correspondent cannot vouch for its accuracy) that one company of English capitalists offered to build the road for thirty million acres of land and refund the Government money expended on construction. This will not include surveys.

The greater portion of Kinburn, a small village on the Ottawa, was destroyed by fire last night. Loss about \$10,000.

McCright, Q. C., and Robertson, Q. C., have been tendered, it is understood, judgeships in British Columbia under the recent Judiciary Act.

THE Baroness Burdett Countess has become almost proverbial in England and throughout the British Empire for her riches and for her wisdom. She has been justly regarded as the ideal of what a person in her position should be, and her name was a power in the land. She had become almost as much a public person as Mr. Gladstone or Lord Beaconsfield, or perhaps a better comparison, Miss Fry or Miss Nightingale. That she should crown a life replete with wisdom and true charity by an act of extreme foolishness, as her proposed marriage with Mr. Bartlett appears to be, is naturally a great shock to the public. It is said that she had been advised from all sides against the marriage, but that even the persuasions of the Queen and Lord Beaconsfield have been exerted without effect. Everybody is trying to comfort himself for the complete overthrow of respect for this wise lady, or rather for the loss of the object which this foolish act argues, by quoting proverbs which appear to be germane, such as, "There is no fool like an old fool," and, "Only a really wise man can do an extremely foolish act," &c. But, after all, that these wise sayings have found such prominent justification is but cold comfort for the loss of such an ideal.—*Montreal Witness.*

Stipendiary Magistrate's Court.

STEWART VS. LAWSON.

THE action of W. D. Stewart vs. S. G. Lawson, for defamatory libel, was commenced this morning. The Courtroom was thronged. Malcolm McLeod, Q. C., and A. Peters appeared for the prosecutor; E. J. Hodgson, Q. C., for the traverser. The evidence so far has been of a formal nature. We condense as follows:—

H. A. McPHERSON—(examined by Mr. M. McLeod)—knows S. G. Lawson, and W. D. Stewart. Stewart has been a Commission Merchant, and is so now. S. G. Lawson is editor of the *Presbyterian* newspaper, which has been issued by him for several years. Identifies the paper, and also a copy purchased by him at the store of H. A. Harvie, in which the alleged libel appeared.

JAMES P. HARPER, clerk in store of H. A. Harvie, (sworn)—Mr. Harvie had not sold the *Presbyterian*, before the date in which the alleged libel appeared. Mr. S. G. Lawson brought the papers to Harvie's himself on the 5th August, for sale, and they were sold to everyone who asked for them.

JAMES D. IRVING, (sworn)—Is Deputy Prothonotary of Supreme Court. There was a suit pending lately between S. G. Lawson and W. D. Stewart. Read first count of declaration of the libel complained of in that suit. It is identical with an extract in the article published in the *Presbyterian* of the 5th August. Read also 4th count of said declaration, which is identical with another extract in said article. The suit was docketed last term and a retraction or confession in settlement of the suit, was made by S. G. Lawson and witnessed by Neil McLeod.

DAVID LAWSON, (sworn)—Have seen the handwriting of S. G. Lawson. The signature to the retraction looks like his but witness is not positive.

PATRICK McQUAID, (sworn)—Was connected with the staff of the *EXAMINER* since 1877. A paragraph in the issue of the *EXAMINER* of the 5th August referring to the *Presbyterian*, was inserted as an advertisement or special notice.

JOSEPH W. MITCHELL, (sworn)—Knew nothing of the advertisement referred to.

NEIL McLEOD (sworn)—proved the signature to the retraction in the Supreme Court.

N. A. MITCHELL (sworn)—is bookkeeper in the *EXAMINER* office and inserted an advertisement in *EXAMINER* of 5th August—which was charged as such—Identified the *Presbyterian*, in which the alleged libel was published, as the paper published by traverser.
