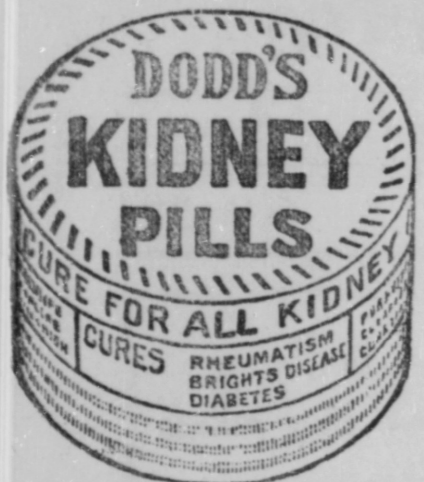

SHIPMENTS TO ENGLAND.

A report concerning Canadian shipments to Great Britain has been issued by Lord Strathcona. We quote the items about which P. E. Island farmers are particularly interested:

CANADIAN POULTRY.

Canadian poultry has not yet attained the dignity of separate place in the trade returns, so that it is difficult to give any idea of the extent of the trade. It is certain, however, that larger consignments were sent over than ever before, and that the trade, especially in turkeys, is rapidly growing.

FRESH MEAT.

Neither fresh nor salted meat has hitherto come to the United Kingdom from Canada in any quantity. The matter has received considerable attention from time to time, but so far has apparently not taken any tangible hold upon the people. There is no doubt as to the market afforded by the large centres in the United Kingdom for commodities of the kind, but there are many considerations connected with the trade that must be taken into account before it can be established on a sure and safe basis. Full information has been transmitted in previous reports as to the prices that prevail, and the conditions under which the meat is sold.

BUTTER.

The total import of butter into the United Kingdom was valued last year at £15,916,571.

CHEESE.

"The import of cheese into the United Kingdom last year was £4,970,247, of which Canada contributed £2,943,725; the import from the United States was £1,006,588. This shows that the Canadian trade is established on a firm basis, but I regret to say that complaints about the quality of the packing have been more numerous during the past year than formerly. The boxes are said not to be always strong enough, and consequently get damaged in transit. Statements have been made as to unpleasant flavor in some of the cheese. It is added that the cheese from some districts ripens too quickly, and becomes hard and will not keep. Hard cheese turns out unsatisfactory to the retailer. Some of my correspondents seem to believe the cheese is not sufficiently protected from the sun while waiting at the wharves for shipment.

HORSES.

"There has been a falling-off in the number of horses imported generally, including Canada. It may be that the reduction in the case of Canada is more apparent than real, for the reason that numbers of animals are shipped by way of United States ports and are included in the British trade returns as coming from that country. So far as I can gather, the animals have generally given satisfaction, but, in the case of cattle, there is said to have been rather a falling off in quality. There is a large market for horses in different parts of the United Kingdom, and this will continue to exist so long as they provide the chief and most popular motive power.

CATTLE.

"It will be observed from the returns that there is a slight falling off in the number of cattle imported into the United Kingdom during the last year. There are decreases in the case of both the United States and Canada, but the importations from the Argentine Republic are gradually increasing.

As far as Canada is concerned, the complaint is again repeated that the quality of the animals is not up to that of former years. No exception is taken to the cattle in the earlier part of the season, and the ranch cattle are also favorably spoken of, but after the first month or so each year, many of the animals are small and of inferior quality. This tends naturally to keep prices down, and may to some extent account for unsatisfactory business which has been reported for the last few years. It is not pleasant to hear comparisons unfavorable to Canadian cattle such as are now so frequently made.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—It has been officially intimated that there will be no insolvency legislation this session of Parliament. The Montreal Gazette remarks that "devising means for the greatest expenditure that has been does not leave the Government much time to devote to mere mercantile wants."

Financing for the Chinese.

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 20.—Kang Yu Wei, the Cantonese reformer, is reported by the afternoon papers to be behind a gigantic Chinese scheme to form companies in every city of consequence in the United States, Canada and Australia, which will attempt to control Chinese capital in order to further all Oriental industries. It is understood that when Kang was in Vancouver, he outlined the scheme to a number of prominent Chinese merchants, and his ideas were quickly acted upon. One of the promoters, when asked today if the scheme would prove workable, said: "We have no doubts about its success. Our plan is to give the Chinese a chance to invest their money in this country, and to further all Chinese industries. There are at present 5,000,000 Chinese in Canada, Australia and United States, and they will all, we think, go into the scheme. As soon as our company is formed here, we will send our agents and firm companies of any size in Canada, United States and Australia. We expect to issue altogether about sixty million dollars worth of stock. In Canada alone, we will issue five million dollars worth.

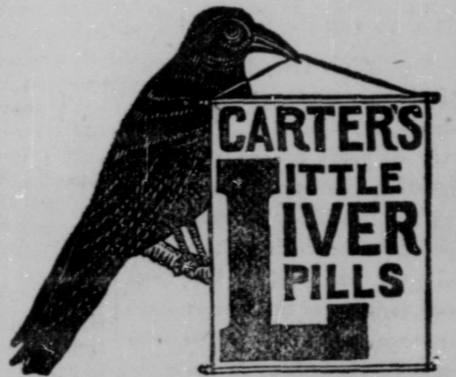
A PANDEMONIUM OF WOE.

Sufferers at the Shrine of Our Lady of Lourdes.

LOURDES, France, May 20.—The annual pilgrimage to the Shrine of Our Lady of Lourdes is now at its height. Fully 40,000 sufferers and their attendants are quartered there. The town is crowded to its utmost capacity. Over 5,000 arrived in one day from Paris alone. When the special trains, bearing their burdens of sorrow, woe and misery, arrived at the station, the scenes were heartrending. Some of these poorer sufferers painfully dragged themselves along the road toward the hospital on foot. Those unable to walk were carried on mattresses by friends and relatives, to the quarters assigned them. It was a pandemonium of woe.

Some pathetic scenes were witnessed. One young woman, scarcely out of her teens, slowly and painfully hobbled from a train. Death was written in her wan face and wasted figure. A blue-bloused porter tenderly helped her from the station platform and into a carry-all, where she sank exhausted and died before reaching the grotto.

Wasted forms, withered arms and legs, devoured faces, deformed bodies, abounded on all sides. Amid all this misery, however, shone the star of pure faith—a light that brought the multitude to pray in the grotto and bathe in the pool.
