Ellis, Crozier, Cournoyer battle For Rookie Award

Early season performances strongly suggest a tight battle in the race for the National Hockey League's rookie-of-the-year award among three players—Ron Ellis, Roger Crozier and Yvan Cournoyer.

Ellis, a 46-goal scorer with Toronto Marlies, the Ontario Hockey Association Junior A series last season, appears to have a slight edge over Crozier and Cournoyer. The Toronto Maple Leaf right winger has scored six goals in 10 games, second only to Chicago Black Hawks' Bobby Hull's seven.

The three will have an opportunity to add to their performances during the weekend with four games scheduled. Toronto plays host to New York Rangers Saturday while Chicago meet the Canadiens at Montreal. Sunday's action has Montreal at Detroit and Chicago at Boston.

Crozier, the 25-year-old goalie who took over in goal for Detroit for veteran Terry Sawchuk when the latter was picked up by Toronto in the summer draft sessions, has the best record in the league to date—having allowed only 15 goals in nine games and posting three shut-outs. The Red Wings are in first place and are riding a seven-game unbeaten streak.

Cournoyer, the 185-pound right winger with the Canadiens —a 63-goal marksmen in the OHA last season—has counted only two goals this season, but the experts figure he can fill the bill left vacant by the retirement of Bernie Geoffrion.

Ellis has been to be given a slight edge to capture the Calder Trophy and the \$1,000 award given to the rookie-of-the-year because of the powerful line he toils on with expert playmakers such as left winger Andy Bathgate and centre Frank Mahovlich feeding him the puck. The 19-year-old can't help but score a bucketful of goals.

Ellis has shown more than just scoring success in his first 10 games. The youngster has proven the better backchecker of the trio since he has not had a single turnover and has shown a tremendous amount of hustle.
