Plan School Valentine Party At Montague

Plans to hold a school Valentine party were made last night at the meeting of the Montague Home and School Association presided over by the president, Dr. G. S. A. Inman. It was moved that in conjunction with the Beaver Club, the association would sponsor the party, and committee including Mrs. C. J. Boudreau and Mr. John Hughes was appointed to interview the executive of the Beaver Club to make arrangements. Following the reading of the minutes, read by Mrs. Elsie Watterworth, the members, 24 of whom attended the meeting, discussed sponsoring an amateur cavalcade, and a committee including Carl Boehner, Miss Shirley Jenkins and Lorne Wigginton, was appointed to make arrangements. No Interruption In Pensions To Blind

OTTAWA, Feb. 5 — (CP) — Pensions to the blind will continue uninterrupted pending the working out of agreements between the Federal Government and the Provinces for sharing the cost of the payment of health department officials said today. Previously it has been reported that there would be no federal contributions to blind pensions in those provinces which have not signed agreements. Legislation passed at the last session of parliament provides that the Dominion pay 75 per cent of \$40-a-month blind pensions and the provinces the remainder. However, there will be no Federal contribution to old-age assistance for persons aged 65 to 69 pending the signing of cost-sharing agreements, though the agreements may be made retroactive. Yesterday, the department announced the signing of agreements with British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Quebec.

New Crackdown On Cigaret Smuggling

ALBANY, N. Y., Feb. 5 — (AP) — The New York Legislature today approved tough legislation to put teeth in a Canadian-American crackdown on cigaret-smuggling across the border.
