ORGANIZED LABOR HAS AN OPINION

Labor sorely needs representatives who will present before the Legislative Assembly all the facts pertaining to the needs of wage earners.

We believe that our problems, if fairly presented, will be fairly judged by all members of the Assembly regardless of what branch of industry or profession they embrace as their life's work.

Heretofore, members of the Legislature elected by the people of urban areas have not satisfactorily represented wage earners nor as conscientiously or effectively as they might were they to apply the democratic principle that "equal rights be extended to all people."

Consumer and producer are directly dependent on each other. If farmers and fishermen do not produce, the consumer may not eat. If the wage earner does not receive sufficient pay, he is unable to pay a price which will assure the farmer and fisherman a profit for their labors.

Poverty does not belong within the midst of plenty. A fairer distribution of provincial income will provide a large and ready market for products of the sea and of the farm and at the same time assure a decent standard of living for all.

Charlottetown labor organizations affiliated with the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada and trade unions affiliated with the Canadian Congress of Labor recommend to all wage earners that they support on May 25th any candidate who has pledged publicly to institute for the first time an equitable and just code of labor laws for the Province of P. E. I.
