Five Farm Buildings Burn At N. Granville

NORTH GRANVILLE — Five buildings, including a large barn, a wood house, granary and an unoccupied house, were destroyed at the farm home of Emerson Matheson, North Granville on Friday afternoon about 2 o'clock.

Lost also were 800 bushels of oats and two sows.

The New Glasgow fire brigade answered the alarm and stood by to save the new home built about a year ago.

The fire was discovered by a small daughter who called Mrs. Matheson.

Mrs. Matheson's mother, Mrs. Urbain Taylor, who is an invalid, was taken to the home of relatives near by. All the furnishings were removed from the home.

The fire is believed to have been started around the pump motor, for that is where the little girl discovered the fire and told her mother.

Contract Let For Dredging

A contract for approximately \$19,575 has been awarded by the department of public works, to Norman N. MacLean, of Murray River, P.E.I., for dredging at Fishing Cove, P.E.I. Work will be carried out under the supervision of the District Engineer at Charlottetown, and it is expected that the project will be completed within six weeks of by September 16, 1959.

An area along the breakwater at Fishing Cove is to be dredged, measuring 365 feet long and ranging in width from 51 feet to 165 feet. An area at the wharf will also be dredged, about 270 feet long and ranging in width from 62 feet to 135 feet. This will involve the removal of approximately 8,700 cubic yards (place measurement) of sand, silt and gravel at the unit price of \$2.25 per cubic yard.

Plans and specifications were prepared by the Charlottetown district office of the harbours and rivers engineering branch, department of public works.

Air Patrol Finds 75 Illegal Traps

ALBERTON — A six-hour air patrol by officers of the federal department of fisheries resulted in the seizure of 75 lobster traps near Alberton Harbours on Saturday.

Two large piles of fresh lobster shells were also said spotted near the shore at Alberton South giving evidence of considerable poaching operations.

The location of the illegally-set fishing gear was radioed to the patrol vessel "Obelia" and the traps were picked up and destroyed.

Two other lines of traps were reported clearly sighted, one north and one south of Alberton Harbour, and these are expected to be picked up today.

The air patrol was carried out by protection officers Carl Solows of Halifax and Elmore McKay of Alberton. The plane, chartered in Halifax, was piloted by Arthur Farmer.

More than 60 men who served with Charlottetown's 2nd Medium Battery during the Second World War held a unit re-union in Charlottetown Saturday. Special guests included His Honor, Lieutenant-Governor F. Walter Hyndman, E.D., and his army aide, Major Roy MacGillivray, C.D.

Speaking informally during the dinner Lieutenant Governor Hyndman stated that during his term of office occasions featuring veterans would always have priority.

Major D. J. MacCormack, C.D., filled in for guest speaker Captain Horace Trites of Moncton who was unable to be present due to unfavorable flying weather. At times humorous and at times serious, Major MacCormack's reminiscences were much enjoyed by all present. Several other members of the unit also spoke briefly.
