

Local and Other Items.

THE storm drum was hoisted at the station in this city at three o'clock.

THE steamer *Miramichi* arrived from Quebec this morning with a large cargo of merchandize.

THE trotting horse "Deceiver," owned by Mr. Geo. Muttart, of Summerside, P.E. Island, has been sold in St. John. The price paid is understood to be about \$300.

THE steamer *M. A. Starr* sailed for Halifax yesterday evening at six o'clock with 1,000 barrels potatoes, shipped by B. W. Higgs; 700 bushels oats, shipped by O. Connolly, and 18 barrels oysters.

THE Grits are apparently looking about them to secure a seat for that notorious corruptionist, Lafamme, who was recently driven from Jacques Cartier. The Goderich, Ont., *Star* says:—"Rumor has it that Mr. Cameron is about to jump the South Riding of Huron, in the interest of Hon. R. Lafamme."

AT the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon Roderick Gillis, drunk and driving disorderly, was fined \$3 and costs or fourteen days. John Darrach, for the same offence, was fined the same. William O'Brine, drunk and wandering about the streets, was fined the same. James Goodman, for assault on John Coyle, was arraigned and the case was adjourned until Monday.

A SUBJECT which begins to attract the solicitude of the people of Brazil is the many immense tracts of land held by planters and other capitalists in a wild condition, serving no purpose. The imposition of a land tax is advocated, so as to force these uncultivated lands into the market, cause a beneficial subdivision of the soil, and prepare for the time when slavery shall have ceased to exist in the Empire.

THE St. James' Church will be opened on Sunday, the 20th inst., when the Rev. Donald McRae will preach at 11 a.m., the Rev. John Lathern at 3 p.m., and the Rev. Principal McKnight at half-past 6 p.m. A collection will be taken up at each service in aid of the building fund, which, the trustees entertain the hope, will be as liberal as the the depressed times will admit. The seats will be free to all, without distinction.

THE Berlin Post gives the number of beet-sugar factories in operation in Germany, at the time of the latest returns, as forty-five, of which forty-three were in Prussia. In the first quarter of the current year, 833,159 quintals of beets were submitted to treatment. The exports last year reached 47,831 quintals of refined sugar, 242,491 of raw sugar, and 18,971 quintals of molasses and syrups. The imports during the same time were 6,683 quintals of refined sugar, 3,197 of raw sugar, and 7,766 quintals of molasses and syrups.

THE "Evening Star," which has been lost to view for the last seven or eight years, re-appeared on Tuesday night last at Hamilton, Lot 18. It shines again in all its former lustre and beauty. "Evening Star" Division, No. 50, of the Sons of Temperance, was re-organized by the G. W. Patriarch, on Tuesday last, with twenty members. The officers are: W. P., Wm. Sinclair; W. A., M. Stewart; R. TWO murder trials will take place in this Province during the month of November. The second trial of the Osborne family, for the murder of Timothy McCarthy (about a year ago), will begin at Dorchester on the second Tuesday of the month, a special session of the Westmorland Circuit Court having been called for that purpose. The other case is that of Thos. Dowd, with Mrs. Ward as an accomplice, who it will be remembered was committed for trial at the Coroner's inquest closed a few weeks ago. This trial will open at St. Andrews on the 12th of November. These are two of the strangest cases in the annals of Canadian crime, and have attracted universal attentions.—*Times*.

LAST night, at a late hour, the store of Mr. Daniel McNaughton, at Hyndman's Brewery, on Malpeque Road, was burglariously entered by a party or parties as yet unknown. The burglars obtained an entrance to the store through a cellar hatch which was carelessly left open. Entering, they found the outer door of the safe open and the inner door locked. They broke the latter, but not finding any cash, they did not disturb the contents. They then opened the shop doors from the inside, and left the premises, carrying with them a chest of tea, a number of bottles of syrup, and sundry other articles. No clue to the burglars has yet been found.

AN old man named Neil McLeod, of Belfast, narrowly escaped instant death at the Railway House, which is kept by Mr. J. Bolger, on Water Street East. At a late hour last night McLeod, who is a cripple, attempted to descend the front stairs without aid. In doing so he tripped and fell headlong from the top to the bottom, where he was found all but lifeless, with blood flowing freely from different parts of his head. Dr. Creamer was immediately summoned, and on arrival found him still unconscious, with the scalp totally lifted from the back of his head to the eyebrows, and his body, generally, shaken by the fall. The Doctor did all in his power to relieve him. In dressing the scalp wound he found it necessary to insert fourteen stitches. The old man is now recovering under the skillful treatment of Dr. Creamer.
