The Right Reverend W. A. Cameron, M.A., D.D., LL.D., Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada is to be the guest of honour and special preacher in the Kirk of St. James at Divine Service on Sunday Morning, Dr. Cameron is a native of Ontario, a graduate of the University of Toronto and Knox College, and has had wide experience in both pastoral work and executive responsibility for the Church. After serving in several pastorates in Western Canada and on the Pacific Coast he was appointed in 1930 to succeed the late Dr. A. S. Grant as Secretary of the General Board of Missions, a post he filled with distinction to himself and with conscientious devotion to the Church and her far-flung missionary enterprises. In June last he was unanimously elected to the highest office in the gift of the Church when he was made Moderator of the General Assembly. In October he was honoured by the University of Toronto when he had conferred upon him a Doctorate in Laws. Dr. Cameron has just come to Prince Edward Island after attending the opening of Parliament in Ottawa and will fill the following engagements in this Presbytery: Kirk Sunday Morning; Brookfield, Sunday Afternoon; Summerside, Sunday Evening; New London, Monday Evening; Tyne Valley, Tuesday Evening; Wednesday he leaves for the Presbytery of St. John.

Fine Exhibit Of Maritime Handicraft

An interesting exhibit of the best of Maritime handicrafts is now on display in the Brace Block, Queen Street. It ranges from hand-woven jackets for men to hand-carved totem pole design table lamps. The exhibit has been arranged by Professor Thomas Lothian, of Prince of Wales College, to show what can be done in this field, both for pleasure and for possible profit.

The exhibit, which shows the work of people in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and this Province, will be on display for two weeks until December 5th.

Professor Lothian stated last night that the exhibit was designed to promote island crafts and to develop them as an industry. He said the work had been started here by the Women's Institutes and this showing was planned to further and encourage their efforts.

Though confined to a relatively small area the display encompasses a wide range of objects. In it are some really splendid jewel sets, fleece lined slippers, floor rugs, bridge table covers, neckties, dolls, wood carvings, shopping bags, pottery, leather and many wooden dishes.

Loading Fourth Boat At Railway Wharf

Crossman and Bradshaw, potato dealers from Albany, are presently loading their fourth boat at the railway wharf. The latest arrival is the S. S. Mapleboro which will load 75,000 bags of seed and tablestock for Florida. Each ship being loaded has taken between two and three thousand of "medium small" turnips.

Mr. Douglas Crossman states that the first shipment of potatoes to arrive in Florida were in excellent condition and the consignment was very much pleased with the quality of the stock. Altogether this fall the firm of Crossman and Bradshaw have shipped a total of 301,000 bags of potatoes by water from Charlottetown. Another potato boat is expected on the 23rd of this month and another on the 5th of December.

This sudden boom along the waterfront has meant employment for a large number of men, and has gone a long way to relieve a somewhat serious situation. The shippers employ 30 checkers, la-
