**Economic Council's Review Requires Second Printing**

OTTAWA (CP)—The author and publisher of almost any book can count it a success if a second printing has to be ordered to meet the demand. By that standard, the first annual review put out by the Economic Council of Canada last January, is a publishing success. A second printing of 8,000 copies in English and French has been ordered from the Queen's Printer.

But the 215-page book on Canada's economic goals for 1970 is regarded by council sources as a success from more than just that standpoint. It is still being quoted widely and recommended as required reading by most leading economists and hard-headed businessmen.

One firm—Northern Electric Co. Ltd.—produced its own vest-pocket condensation of the review and has already ordered a second print of 25,000 copies for distribution to anyone who asks for it.

PREPARE OWN VERSIONS

Similar condensations, summaries and some critiques have been prepared by such influential organizations as the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, the Canadian Bakers' Association, and the Canadian Chamber of Commerce.

Before the council put out the blue-and-gold soft-covered book, there was a considerable amount of discussion and some suspicion about the value of a governmental body undertaking indicative planning for the long-range future.

There were many who said this would only lead to regimentation, and would at a minimum upset traditional forces of supply and demand which for most generations past had served Canada's growth well enough.

But since the first annual review made its appearance six months ago, expression of such fears has tapered off and such organizations as the Canadian Chamber of Commerce have become boosters for the council's first work.

The 80,000-word book took the view that Canada had fallen short of its economic potential in recent years and to achieve its potential in the next five years the country would need to increase its total real output by 50 per cent, raise real per-capita income 20 per cent, find and create 1,500,000 new jobs and increase productivity 24 per cent a year between 1963 and 1970.

The council emphasized that its first annual review set goals and targets to be achieved by the combined efforts of all levels of government, business and individuals. They aren't forecasts of what will be achieved by easy laissez-faire attitudes.

When the book was first published, the Queen's Printer set a price of \$3.50 on it. Whether the price will come down with the second printing is not yet known.

**Trading Slow On N.Y. Mart During Week**

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market last week continued to backtrack for the third straight week but trading was very slow most of the time.

Volume for the week was 24,867,331 compared with 26,427,300 the previous week. It was the smallest turnover for any full, five-day trading week since the week ended Jan. 9 when 23,334,940 shares changed hands.

Lightness of trading on any stock market move reflects lack of strong participation and therefore is regarded as an omen but trading "wants" to go in the opposite direction. This was not quite borne out this week because the days of heaviest trading were days of sharp decline, whereas there was lesser volume on two days of recovery.

The Dow Jones Industrial average this week declined 3.97 to 918.04.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks fell 2.3 to 335.8.

**MORE ARE LOSERS**

A number of leading issues emerged from the week with respectable gains, even though losers outnumbered gainers by 970 to 406 among the 1,558 issues traded.

A single block of 286,800 shares helped make Consolidated Cigar the "most active" issue of the week. Not far behind it was American Telephone whose rise of 1% reflected increased enthusiasm for the erstwhile stock.

With the approach of heavy summer traffic, airlines rallied.

Eastern Air Lines was the most active and raked up a gain of 5% to close the week at 68 1/2.

Chrysler slipped two points on the week and General Motors
